Sunburned Hair

The "cold gray dawn of the morning after" vacation periods is apt to show a faded, bleached-out, straggling, and a dry and wispy look to the hair after a couple of weeks or a month spent bareheaded outdoors. This is the result of sunburning the scalp, and in other years because the sun has not been doing its regular duty this year. It has been backsliding—clouds, but then there are a number of sunburned heads that do need looking after, and this is how to go after them:

The first thing is to get the scalp back into a healthy state. Brushing is the shortest cut to a healthy scalp. Brush your hair, at least twice a day, morning and evening. That sounds like much more work than it is. It takes not more than a couple of minutes to wash your hair fifty times. And I don't know of any better habit you can acquire than this.

If the hair is dry and crisp rub into the scalp and hair a minute quantity of vaseline, olive oil, or sweet almond oil—just enough to give the hair a natural softness.

The eyebrows are quite as susceptible to the hot rays of the sun as the hair. So you must give them special attention on your return to town. With an eyebrow brush or a small fine tooth brush night and morning brush your eyebrows to promote their growth and to keep them from falling out. Rub vaseline into them before brushing. Be careful not to let the vaseline get into your eyes, as it is most irritating to them. Any ointment, in fact, used on the eyebrows and eyelids must be applied with extreme care.

The following tonic is excellent: yellow vaseline, two ounces; oil of lavender, fifteen drops; and oil of rosemary, fifteen drops. Mix thoroughly. After you wash your face at night brush your eyebrows with the tiny brush upon which a few drops of the tonic have been placed. Particular pains must be taken to apply this tonic to your eyebrows, as it will irritate the eyes, as any oil will, if it gets into them.

Doctors, health departments and social workers all make mistakes. The tuberculosis problem is so wide and deep that it is no wonder we "get in wrong" here and there.

Take, for example, the law which, in some communities, requires disinfection, renovation and general cleaning up of apartments after the removal or death of a person who had tuberculosis while living there. Such a law should never have been placed on the statute books. It not only does not constitute security from infection to members of the household, but it actually focuses public attention upon an unimportant risk and thus over-shadow the actual dangers. For it is a thoroughly established truth that tuberculosis is acquired through intimate and prolonged contact with the living, careless patient, and not from contaminated apartments he may have vacated. What Science Knows Three Discoveries Just Learned

A large percentage of cancerous growths are the outcome of skin disease, to which blands, and others whose skins burn and freckle easily, are very susceptible. This is why science recommends that such persons should avoid the sun as much as possible.

Radium is being successfully used in several English hospitals for the eradication of birthmarks. It is said to remove blemishes of this kind readily and without leaving any noticeable trace of disfigurement. Superficial growths of other kinds, such as warts, are also yielding to the radium treatment.

The squall of wind which so often accompanies thunderstorms is supposed to be due to the downward flow of a cataract of air which is cooled and kept cooled in its descent by the rain or hail falling through it. The sudden rise in air pressure at the start of a severe thunderstorm is ascribed to the combined effect of the downward thrust, greater density and relatively small absolute humidity of this cold wind, and to the interference which the storm offers to the free flow of the general winds.


The case of John F. Lax, Jr., against R. L. Barnes was continued until the next term of court.

DIRECTORS OF S. A. L. FAVOR EXTENSION PLANS

Provide for Consolidation With Carolina, Atlantic and Western and \$3,000,000 Mortgage Issue.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY WARFIELD

Tidewater Connections of New Company Will Make It Especially Valuable to Older Concern—To Operate About 340 Miles of Road.

NEW YORK, October 7.—Directors of the Seaboard Air Line Railway today approved plans providing for a consolidation with the Carolina, Atlantic and Western Railway and an issue of a \$3,000,000 mortgage. This is in accordance with the company's policy of financial expansion and constructive extension announced several weeks ago.

An announcement by S. D. Warfield, chairman of the board, says the consolidated company, to be known as the Seaboard Air Line Railway Company, is to have an authorized capital stock of \$100,000,000, the same amount as the \$300,000,000 mortgage. This is to be divided into 1,000,000 shares, par value \$100, of which there will be issued \$27,250,000 preferred shares and \$72,750,000 common shares.

Of the \$27,250,000 preferred stock, \$2,280,000 will be exchanged for an equal amount of common stock of the present company, and \$25,000,000 of the stock of the Carolina, Atlantic and Western Railway.

Above the \$27,250,000 preferred stock, \$2,280,000 will be exchanged for an equal amount of 5 per cent, fifty-year refunding bonds of the Carolina company, converting that issue into a preferred stock.

New preferred stock amounting to \$25,000,000 is to be exchanged for a like amount of present Seaboard stock, with unaltered dividend provisions.

NEW BONDS ENTITLED TO NONCUMULATIVE DIVIDENDS The \$2,280,000 stock to be exchanged for Carolina refunding bonds are to be entitled to noncumulative dividends of 6 per cent before dividends are declared on the common. The \$25,000,000 preferred stock is to be noncumulative at 4 per cent before dividends are declared on the common.

Under the new mortgage, approximately \$25,650,000 thirty-year, 6 per cent bonds will be presently issued, of which approximately \$2,750,000 will be retained in the treasury.

Of the remainder, a part is to be used in exchange for underlying bonds or constituent companies. The balance has been sold to a syndicate under the direction of the Guaranty Trust Company and the National City Bank of this city.

The Seaboard Air Line owns and operates by lease about 3,100 miles of the Carolina, Atlantic and Western Railway, incorporated in South Carolina, operates in North and South Carolina, with a total trackage of about 250 miles.

The Seaboard Railway has for a long time guaranteed the underlying bonds of the Carolina company, whose "tidewater connections will make it especially valuable in the consolidation."

CONSCRIPTION FAVORED BY FORBES-ROBERTSON

All denied that German agents had supplied them with funds to leave Ireland, and said they had planned some time ago to emigrate to America, and chose the present time to avoid compulsory service under the British colors.


William Adolph Pleads Guilty, and is Sentenced to Serve Thirty Days in Jail.
