

COX IS APPOINTED ON GEOLOGICAL SURVEY

Succeeds George P. Johnson, Resigned, as Member of State Board.

ENLARGE FORESTRY WORK

Appropriation of \$10,000 Is Made for Prevention of Forest Fires and to Check Uneconomic Destruction of Timber Resources of State.

Former Speaker of the House of Delegates, E. P. Cox, of Richmond, was appointed by Governor Stuart yesterday a member of the Commission of the State Geological Survey to succeed George P. Johnson, resigned. A commission was issued to him at once. With the vacancy filled, the commission went into session for the purpose of planning the forestry campaign of the next two years. The State Geological Survey is in charge of this activity as well as of geological research. Besides Mr. Cox, there were present Superintendent Nichols, of the Virginia Military Institute, and Governor Stuart, who is chairman. The members met in the Governor's office.

The office of State Forester was created by the General Assembly of 1914 and is now held by R. Chapin Jones, who until recently was associate professor of forestry at the University of Virginia. The act of 1914 made no appropriation and the forester received no compensation other than his salary as a member of the University faculty.

APPROPRIATION OF \$10,000 FOR FORESTRY WORK

The last Legislature, however, made an appropriation of \$10,000 for the prosecution of this work, and out of this fund the salary of the forester will be paid. The appropriation will not be available until June 18. The commission will hold another meeting shortly after that date, at which time it will fix the salary of the forester.

At yesterday's meeting the commission mapped out the forestry work of the next two years on general lines. It authorized the State Forester to employ two technical assistants, and during the forest-fire period, three temporary field assistants. Provision was made also for a stenographer, office supplies and printing.

The United States government has already in various sections of Virginia a number of forest wardens who will co-operate with the State Forester. The permanent office of this official will be in Charlottesville. From this office will be conducted an educational campaign directed towards the prevention of forest fires and the uneconomic destruction of the timber resources of the State.

The office will prepare bulletins and literature dealing with scientific forestation, which will be supplied to the farmers of the State and the owners of timber lands generally. Agents of the department will make special studies of particular cases and give expert advice on forest preservation to all citizens of the State who are interested in the subject.

WILL TRY SMITH SATURDAY

Justice Crutchfield Postpones Hearing of Negro Arrested With Eleven Gallons of Whisky.

Justice Crutchfield yesterday continued until Saturday the case against John Smith, the negro arrested at Main Street Station Wednesday night by Sergeants Johnson and Jordan on a charge of having more liquor in his possession than is allowed by law. The negro had eleven gallons, contained in small legs and bottles, at the time of his arrest. He claimed that he was preparing to take it into North Carolina, and that he had purchased it from a down-town saloon. A warrant was sworn out for L. Lewis yesterday, charging him with doing a wholesale business when he had a license only for a retail business. Justice Crutchfield yesterday requested Assistant District Attorney Hiram M. Smith to attend the Police Court on Saturday, when the possibility of the Interstate Commerce statutes having been violated will be gone into.



Agreement Reached in British Cabinet

Will Submit Proposals on Recruiting to Parliament at Secret Session.

LONDON, April 20.—At a meeting today of the British Cabinet an agreement was reached upon the proposals which the ministers will make to Parliament on the subject of recruiting. Their proposals will be submitted at a secret session of each house of Parliament on Tuesday. The foregoing was announced in an official statement issued this afternoon. It is understood that a proposition advanced by Arthur Henderson, president of the Board of Education, and a Labor leader, will have the effect of reopening the voluntary enlistment scheme for a month or six weeks, and that this proposal was adopted in principle by the Cabinet with a view to ascertaining whether sufficient men would come forward for military service without the introduction of general compulsion. Labor members, however, demand that all facts and figures regarding the military situation and requirements shall be submitted to the House of Commons before they consent to any
