BUFFALO TAKES FINAL GAME FROM CLIMBERS

Richmond Loses to Bisons Through Errors at Critical Times—Crowd Almost Equal to Opening Day Sees Game—Kelliher Stars at Bat for Billsmiths.

Liberal hitting, aided by errors, gave Richmond the final game of the season with Richmond yesterday by the count of 8 to 3. The Bisons took advantage of all of the breaks and clouted the pill at opportune times. Had the fielding been perfect, it is probable that the Billsmiths would have cleaned sweep on the Herd, in spite of the decisive score.

It was a perfect day for baseball, and a corking good crowd took advantage of the fact that it was by far the best attendance that Richmond has had on any Saturday since this city has had an International League berth. In spite of the defeat for the local club, the crowd thoroughly enjoyed the pastime, and was full of pep and enthusiasm until the end.

Three errors ruined what chances Richmond had to win the game. All of them came at critical points, and were responsible for the loss. The plays being perfect, the innings in which the scores were made would have been blanks.

Rhoades pitched for Richmond and was touched up on two occasions. Several of the clouts were good ones, but others were extremely scratchy. The Billsmiths only tapped Lore Bader for six, but all were clean.

The Bisons scored on the opener on a walk, triple and sacrifice. Richmond came back with one run in the same frame, a walk and a single, followed by an error being responsible. The Clammers jumped into the lead in the sixth when a double, triple and single scored two runs.


