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BIG LEAGUES GOING WELL

IMPROVED WEATHER HELPS MAJORS ROUND TO FORM Forward Rush of Brooklyn, Chicago and Detroit Only Outstanding Feature of Third Week.

With the weather improving and the teams generally playing in good form so early in the season, the past week furnished some important changes in the standings of the National and American Leagues. Recent bad weather harassed the teams in the National organization more than its rival, having ten games postponed and the latter five games.

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CLIFF MARKLE IS FINE

Former Virginia League Twirler Has Already Won His First Four Starts for New York.

One day last fall during a series between the White Sox and the Yankees, the run of the game brought Jacques Fournier, a hitter of parts and repulse, to the batter's box at an especially tense moment. There were runners on the bases eager to carry home the runs that would probably mean victory for Chicago and defeat for New York, and there was as dangerous a hitter as almost any in the league to bat them in.

But Fournier fanned, and as he stood at the plate wondering whether it would be safe to take a vocal slam at the umpire, he saw the Yankee pitcher and ample to nonchalantly to one side and the air of concern that marked every movement of the New York hurler was so intensely irritating to the big man that he could not resist an impulse to ask him how it felt to fan a good hitter in a pinch.

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ORGANIZED BASEBALL HAS NOT PAID PEACE PRICE

NEW YORK, April 30.—Another phase of the Cincinnati peace agreement between organized baseball and the Federal League has come to light in the hitch over the payment of indemnity by the American and National Leagues to the Brooklyn, Newark and Pittsburgh clubs of the independent organization. The attorneys for organized baseball have recommended that this money be not paid, because of Baltimore's repudiation of the terms of peace.

It is understood that organized ball was to pay \$350,000 to the Ward interests for Washington Park, in Brooklyn, while Harry E. Sinclair was to receive about \$75,000 for the Federal League establishment in Harrison, N. J., just outside of Newark. Edward W. Gwinn, of the Pittsburgh Feds, was to be reimbursed to the amount of \$50,000 for his losses in the Smokey Mountain case, and also in bringing payments should be paid, and the reason for the delay is the action of the Baltimore club in refusing to agree to the terms of the peace agreement.

In speaking about the situation yesterday, President John K. Tener of the National League, said: "Each league understood that each of its clubs would carry out the terms of the agreement. The Baltimore club was at that time one of the eight parts of the Federal League in making the peace agreement. The National League spoke for it and undertook to see to it that Baltimore should comply with the terms of the peace agreement. "As is now well known," continued President Tener, "the Baltimore Federal League club has not only refused to carry out the peace agreement, but has gone further and brought an action in the United States courts charging that the Federal League, by signing the peace agreement, conspired with organized ball to injure and destroy the Federal Baltimore club. "It is apparent that the Federal League has not carried out the obligation it took in the peace agreement. The National and American Leagues naturally decline to pay for something that they have not received. Until the Federal League keeps its promise and secures from its constituent clubs an acceptance of the peace agreement, no payment will be made under the agreement."
