CROP SUMMARY

Tobacco Planters Take Advantage of Showery Weather and Accomplish Much Work. The following weekly crop summary was issued yesterday by the United States Weather Bureau: The week was abundant rains in all sections of the District, but in the extreme southwest and the extreme north, and even in these counties the rainfall, though deficient as compared with the normal, was not so much as to check crop growth. Additionally, the temperatures were generally above the average for the season. The effect of this warm, moist weather was to stimulate the growth of stock and increase the yield of the week found crops in much better condition than at any time since the beginning of the crop season. Wheat and oats made a decided improvement.
