LOMBARDY STREET IS THROWN OPEN TO TRAVEL

Now Extends From Leigh Street to Chamberlayne Avenue, Crossing Brook Road.

MAY COME THROUGH TO BROAD

Affords Direct Driveway to Northern Section of City—Grade Crossing Is Made With Line of Chesapeake Bay Railroad.

Workmen completed the installation of a grade crossing over the tracks of the Richmond and Chesapeake Bay Railroad yesterday at Lombardy Street and the Brook Road, and Lombardy Street from Leigh Street to Chamberlayne Avenue, providing a direct thoroughfare between the West End and the Northern sections of the city, was thrown open to the public in the afternoon.

One obstacle after another developed to delay this improvement, which board members said is of the utmost importance to the Northside.

Commissioner Henry P. Beck said yesterday that, with the opening of Lombardy Street from Leigh Street to Chamberlayne Avenue, through what is known as Chamberlayne court, efforts would be made in the near future to open the street across the tracks of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad, from Broad Street.

The railroad company, however, is protesting against the installation of a grade crossing across its tracks at Marshall Street, because of the fact that a number of fast through trains use these tracks, and such a crossing would be exceedingly dangerous, as the situation now exists.

MAY BE OPENED THROUGH TO BROAD STREET

With the erection of the new union passenger station on the site of the Hermitage Golf Club, however, the tracks on Marshall Street, will be of less importance, and Mr. Beck said yesterday, there should be no objection to the installation of the crossing under those conditions. With Lombardy Street extended through to Broad Street, a direct thoroughfare would be provided from Broad Street to the Northside. Such a street is highly desirable for many reasons, Mr. Beck said, but primarily as it would provide a direct route for the fire company located at Lombardy and Broad Streets, which would respond to alarms in the northern section of the city.

Despite Threats Made by Officers of the Richmond and Chesapeake Bay Railroad that they would object to the installation of the crossing over the

tracks at Brook Road until some agreement had been reached with the city for the protection of the company's rights, the railroad offered no physical objection to the crossing, carrying out orders of the board. The crossing is complete, with the exception of the rearrangement of two poles that are out of position, which will be moved this week. The street was opened to the public, however, yesterday afternoon. The Administrative Board, working for nearly twelve months on the project, secured the rights of way for the street, and later acquired a strip of land from the Kirsch estate, near Chamberlayne Court. Later several property owners objected to the opening of the street, claiming certain proprietary rights. Through the City Attorney's office, these objections were finally overcome, and then there developed the opposition of the railroad company. It was then that the board directed workmen to proceed, and one member asked the Police Department for a detail of men in event that efforts were made to stop the men from installing the crossing.

INVENTORY OF WINES

Richard C. L. Moncreff, collector of internal revenue, is making arrangements with his deputies throughout the Eastern District of Virginia for an assessment of the taxable values of the wine and liquor stocks held in the new revenue act, effective from yesterday. The rate of taxation will hereafter be based upon the percentage alcohol contained in the wines, rather than upon the classification in which they may happen to fall.

The text of a telegram received yesterday by Mr. Moncreff is as follows: "Taxes at following rates take effect Saturday, the 9th instant: On still wines, containing not more than 14 per cent alcohol, 4 cents per gallon; containing more than 14 and not more than 21 per cent, 10 cents; exceeding 21 and not more than 24 per cent, 25 cents; exceeding 24 per cent, \$1.10 per gallon.

On champagne or sparkling wine, 2 cents per half-pint; artificially carbonated wine, 11-2 cents; on liquors, cordials, or similar compounds, containing sweet wines, fortified under provisions of act, 11-2 cents per half-pint. On grape brandy or wine spirits used in fortifying sweet wine, 10 cents per proof gallon. Pending revision, present regulations will apply to fortifications of sweet wine, consent of signers to wine bonds to be secured."

WORCESTER CONTINENTALS TO BRING BACK OLD DRUM

Will Be Escorted From Station to Jefferson Hotel by Virginia Militia.

STREET PARADE IS PLANNED

Mayors of Four Massachusetts Cities to Accompany Troops, Each Escorted by Chief of Police of His Home Town as Bodyguard.

By an agreement reached yesterday between Mayor Anstie and Lieutenant-Colonel Salomonsky, commander of Camp Stuart, the Worcester Continentals, a Massachusetts militia organization, coming to Richmond a week from tomorrow to present to the Confederate Memorial Literary Society a drum taken North during the War Between the States, will be escorted from the railroad station to the Jefferson Hotel by Virginia troops.

During the War Between the States the Continentals picked up on a battle field a drum belonging to the Thirtieth Virginia Regiment and sent it back to Worcester, Mass., where it has remained ever since. The drum is now to be brought home, to rest in the Confederate Museum in Richmond.

The Worcester Continentals expect to arrive in Richmond from Norfolk at 6 o'clock Monday, September 18, and will stay till midnight of Tuesday. They will stop at the Jefferson Hotel while in the city. In addition to the march from the station when they arrive, it is possible that they will make a short street parade Tuesday.

Accompanying the soldiers will be the Mayors of Worcester, Manchester, New Bedford and Springfield, Mass., each of whom will be accompanied by the chief of police of his city in uniform as a personal bodyguard.
