

ANDERSON SPEAKS ON LEE AT THE WOMAN'S CLUB

Celebration of Virginia Day Marked by Brilliant Address on South's Chieftain.

ROSE TO HEIGHTS UNATTAINED

Lee's Work at Washington College After War Declared to Display Qualities of Citizenship Unequaled Even by His Genius in War.

The celebration of "Virginia Day" at the Woman's Club yesterday was marked by a brilliant address on "Virginia First and Last" given by Henry W. Anderson. Mrs. E. Randolph Williams was chairman of the afternoon, and Mrs. Beverley B. Munford presented the speaker to the large audience of members and guests. Mrs. Munford spoke of Mr. Anderson as one to whom the club owed deep appreciation for his services in the past, particularly in their efforts in purchasing the present home of the club.

Lee's birthday is a golden shrine for every Virginian, and Mr. Anderson's eloquent address yesterday was fittingly intended to draw the memory of the last of the cavaliers. He began his lecture with the quotation from a poem inscribed to the stainless commander by Philip Stanhope Wordsley, of Oxford, and the tribute, both to Virginia and her favorite son, was a peculiarly appropriate one.

"Upon such an occasion as this," said Mr. Anderson, "we should forget self and all thoughts of our own achievements and should see in this day an opportunity to stand together in the white light of the spirit of Virginia as expressed in the life of Lee, to seek to draw therefrom guidance for our own lives and inspiration for our own citizenship that we may prove worthy of his example and the highest ideals of the State which he embodied."

The lecture was intended to show the true meaning of "Virginia Day," as expressed in certain incidents of its history and illustrated in the citizenship of Lee. PLANS TO SELL WATERSHED

Lynchburg Common Council Takes Steps to Dispose of It to the Federal Government.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) LYNCHBURG, VA., January 22.—The Common Council to-day took initial steps looking to the sale of the Pedlar River watershed, owned by the city, to the Federal government. It became a part of the forest reserve in that section. It is proposed to sell the government about 7,000 acres at approximately \$7.50 per acre, the city reserving about 700 acres around the lake for enlargement of the lake or the building of another dam there should this be determined upon in the future.
