

### CHILEAN BEAUTY BEGINS TESTIMONY TO-MORROW

Friends of Mrs. DeSaules Seem Confident That She Will Be Acquitted.

QUESTION OF SON'S FATE ARISES If Woman Is Adjudged Not Guilty, Boy Will Probably Be Given Into Her Custody Without Fight—Intent as to Plans.

By H. S. RUSHMORE. MINNEOLA, N. Y., November 24.—"Will you go back to Chile after the trial?" This question was asked of Mrs. Bianca Errazuriz DeSaules, awaiting the resumption of her trial for her life in the Nassau County Jail here to-day by Mrs. Phineas Seaman, wife of the sheriff. Mrs. Seaman, who has been mothering the beautiful young prisoner ever since August 3, when she was arrested for shooting her divorced husband to death, made it clear by her inquiry that she expects an acquittal.

"I like America and Americans," replied Mrs. DeSaules. She would not commit herself further, and for a very sufficient reason.

Several matters of first importance to Mrs. DeSaules and little Jack depend upon the nature of the verdict, even if it be in her favor, as Mrs. Seaman and her other friends expect it to be. Lawyers versed in criminal practice declared to-day that the jury, if not convinced beyond a reasonable doubt of the defendant's guilt, can vote her out from under the shadow of the electric chair in either of two ways. Their verdict can be not guilty, or it can be not guilty because of insanity. In either case her custody of her little son, who will be five next Christmas Day, was declared likely to become enmeshed in legal proceedings. These naturally, it was argued, will be much simplified if no "string" is attached to the verdict.

WILL FIGHT FOR BOY IF SHE IS ERRED

"If Mrs. DeSaules is freed, or rather when she is freed," said Henry Uterhart, her attorney, to-day, "there can be no question that Surrogate Fowler will declare her the legal guardian and custodian of little Jack. Whether the DeSaules family or the Hettscher family, whichever has possession of the boy at the time, will give him up readily is open to argument. But if they decline so to do, habeas corpus proceedings will be instituted, and he will be restored to the rightful guardianship of his mother by regular legal proceedings."

If, on the other hand, Mrs. DeSaules should be adjudged not guilty because of insanity, the question as to whether she should be immediately freed or committed to some institution would rest solely with the presiding justice, David F. Manning, it was declared. In that event, and if she should be committed to an institution for the insane, little Jack's guardianship would become the basis of a contest which might drag on indefinitely in the opinion of lawyers. Mr. Uterhart believes a trephining operation, considered comparatively simple in the present day of advanced surgical science, and the treatment she is already undergoing to remedy the thyroid difficulty, would surely restore Mrs. DeSaules to full normal condition. Uterhart was very far from admitting that she is now insane. But he claims she is not well and that medical, and possibly surgical, treatment will overcome the trouble.

COURT MAY NAME

GUARDIAN FOR BOY But, in the meantime, the courts might name some one other than the mother as Jack's guardian. That there would be vigorous opposition to any such disposition of the boy's custody, Uterhart gave full assurance. Always, in admitting such a possible contingency, he invariably insisted in expressing his unflinching belief in its remoteness.

The question as to whether Mrs. DeSaules would take little Jack out of the United States to reside permanently in a foreign country, it was determined, might also become a factor in determining his guardianship—as it was in the dividing his custody between father and mother following the divorce. Should Mrs. DeSaules be acquitted in a verdict of but two words, however, it was declared, she will surely have Jack all to herself to take where she likes.

Mrs. DeSaules, on account of whose apparent approach to a nervous breakdown, the trial was halted from Friday evening until Monday morning,

contrary to the custom of Justice Manning in capital trials, was much improved shortly before noon to-day when an automobile came whirling up to the jail and little Jack's hearty young voice was heard calling her name. Jack was brought here, as on his previous visit, by Detective Harry S. Doumer.

"See, what I've brought you," said Jack breezily, presenting an immense red rose. He was suitably rewarded. The strict little woman whose emotions were either untouched or held under iron constraint by the recounting of the manner in which she slew her little son's father, was all tenderness and crooning motherliness to the boy. As had been her custom, in preparation for all of his brief visits, she had arranged for a surprise for him.

JACK PLAYS IN JAIL

WITH TOYS MOTHER GIVES "See what I have for you," she said, showing him some mysterious packages. When opened they disclosed two toy boats of different patterns and a real drum. Everyone in the jail shortly was able to testify to the reality of the drum, as Jack's thumping upon it reverberated through the corridors from the sheriff's apartments, where Mrs. DeSaules has a room. And Sheriff Seaman's own particularly bath-tub was soon the scene of a naval conflict in which America was victorious.

Senorita Amelia Errazuriz, younger sister of Mrs. DeSaules, accompanied by Susanne, the French maid, motored to the jail from the city shortly after a hamper, containing a dainty lunchbox to tempt the appetite of the prisoner and Jack.

Mrs. DeSaules, it was declared by Mr. Uterhart to-day, will be the first witness called Monday when the defense starts the presentation of its case. He expects to consume the entire session with her direct examination. District Attorney Weeks, accompanied by an assistant, left here to-day to consult with the alienists he intends to call for the State in rebuttal when the defense is concluded. His alienists are Dr. George H. Kirby, of the Manhattan State Hospital; Dr. P. J. Griffin, of the Hudson State Hospital, and Dr. Harris, of the Brooklyn State Hospital. He will also call an X-ray expert to pass upon the photograph of the defendant's skull, which Mr. Uterhart promised to put in evidence. This photograph was declared to show a fracture, the result of a fall.

ENLISTMENTS YESTERDAY

Army Recruits Five Men—Navy Station Now Stands High in List in Proportion to Population.

The army recruiting station, with five men, headed the list yesterday in the number of recruits enlisted in the service of the government, and the navy station, close on the heels of their infantry competitors, secured four men with others under consideration, while the marine corps rested quietly waiting to hear from the examining physician with reference to two applicants. The officers in charge of the three stations believe that the next week will see a rush for voluntary enlistment on account of the fact that there remain only a little less than three weeks till voluntary enlistment for registered men must cease. From the standpoint of population the Richmond district stands fourth in the list, being preceded by New York, Philadelphia, and Boston, while larger cities in the country, such as Pittsburg, San Francisco, Cleveland and many others, fall below Richmond.
