

SHIPBUILDING SOUTH; ITS FUTURE PROMISES

From Chesapeake Bay to Rio Grande New Yards Springing Up and Keeping Busy.

NEWPORT NEWS STILL IN LEAD

One Hundred Million Dollars' Worth of Ships Going Up Along Hampton Roads—Wilmington, N. C., Getting in the Limelight.

A summary of the main shipbuilding activities along the South Atlantic and Gulf Coast from Maryland to Texas, as given in a recent issue of the Manufacturers' Record, shows the vast aggregate value of over \$400,000,000 in ships now building or under contract.

At Baltimore ships are under way or planned to be completed approximately \$75,000,000, with an indication for a much wider expansion at an early date.

At Wilmington, North Carolina's main seaport, vessels valued at \$1,000,000 are under way.

At Hampton Roads, where the great Newport News shipyard and the Portsmouth Navy Yard are located, and new yards are being established at Norfolk and Hampton, work in hand will aggregate over \$100,000,000 in value.

At Jacksonville, Florida, the largest of the nation's shipbuilding plants, the small yards there had, and now they have, an aggregate of work building under contract that will total in value over \$50,000,000.

Alabama presents Mobile, which, with the big plant of the United States Steel Corporation, promises to become one of the greatest shipbuilding centers in the country, if not in the world.

Mississippi gives Gulfport, Pascagoula and Biloxi, all of which have made great strides, especially Pascagoula, which has contracts for forty-five ships—thirty wooden and fifteen steel.

In Louisiana there is an important development in the New Orleans district, while all along the Texas coast great activities are being shown, especially at Orange, Beaumont and Houston, where shipbuilding has become an industry of first magnitude, with work under way or in hand that will aggregate many millions of dollars.

Thus, it will be seen, practically every Southern port from the Chesapeake Bay to the Rio Grande River is busily engaged in meeting the demands of the government for ships to help win the war, and this condition is being maintained every sense of the word the ever-repeated prophecy of the Manufacturers' Record that Southern ports could be successfully developed for shipbuilding because they possess in an unusually complete manner practically all of the advantages for this industry, and are backed up by a climate that permits outdoor work to be continued the year around with the least loss of time.

Having created this wonderful shipbuilding achievement under pressure of national necessity and to meet the government's urgent need for ships to carry on the war successfully, let us see to it that the millions of dollars and the countless value of brains and energy invested in these splendid enterprises shall not be for the period of the war alone, but shall form the basis for permanent industries that shall occupy a place America in the forefront of the maritime nations of the world and make the Stars and Stripes a familiar sight in every ocean and in every port, thus retaining our cherished prestige of years ago, when we led the way in traversing the endless paths of the sea and established traditions that have today thrill us with the glory of achievement made by our forefathers.

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LIGHT TOBACCO SALES

MAN LEAF MARKETS

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Weather conditions are yet unfavorable for the handling of leaf tobacco, and as a consequence the receipts and sales in the loose-leaf markets of Virginia and North Carolina were light last week.

The sales at the warehouses amounted to only about 100,000 pounds.

The market was very firm last week and prices on all grades of sun-cured leaf were a shade stiffer than the week before.

The warehouses do not look for large receipts until there shall be a decided change in the weather conditions.

LYNCHBURG OBEYS CLOSING ORDER. LYNCHBURG, VA., January 19.—Sales continue light, due to the dry cold weather, and there is not much chance for them to be much larger until there is a change in the weather.

There never was such demand for tobacco on the Lynchburg market, and prices are much higher than ever known.

There was a decided improvement in prices this week, all grades of tobacco, both air-cured and smoked, being actively sought after by the buyers.

Quotations: Lugs, \$15 to \$22; short leaf, \$18 to \$20; good compared with; dapple leaf, \$21 to \$25; wrappers, \$25 to \$30.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE ORDER OF THE national fuel administration the Lynchburg Tobacco Association has decided to suspend sales of tobacco on Monday of each week for ten weeks.

SALES CONTINUE SMALL IN DANVILLE. DANVILLE, VA., January 19.—Owing to cold and generally unfavorable weather the sales this week have again been small.

REACHING END AT ROCKY MOUNT. ROCKY MOUNT, N. C., January 19.—The receipts of leaf tobacco continue light on this market, and will be light until there is a change in the weather.

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HIDE IMPORTATION FROM FOREIGN PORTS IN ORDER

New Regulations Under Which Leather Materials May Come into United States From Abroad.

The Department of Agriculture authorizes the following: All hides of neat cattle, calfskins, buffalo hides, sheepskins, goatskins and deerskins may be imported from any country maintaining an efficient veterinary inspection system when accompanied by a certificate signed by an official veterinarian of such country.

These are new provisions in regulations issued by the United States Treasury Department and the Department of Agriculture governing the handling and control of hides and other animal products.

It is also provided by the regulations that disinfection methods for hides, skins and other to be time by the chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture.

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FACTS ABOUT DANVILLE; NUMEROUS INDUSTRIES

Town That Once Depended on Only One Big Industry Now Stands on Several Legs.

Fifteen Million Dollars Invested in Big Plant—Perfection in Welfare Work—Knitting Mills, Overall Factories and Other Facilities.

DANVILLE, VA., January 19.—The wide-awake city on the Dan had its biggest year's business last year, and it plans to outdo that during the year 1918.

Speaking especially of the past year, their total assets were \$2,250,000 in round numbers, an increase of \$2,000,000 in twelve months.

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TRADE BODIES EXEMPT

Chambers of Commerce That Mean Business All the Time Do Not Pay Income Tax.

The commissioner of internal revenue has issued T. D. 2998, as follows: Section 701, of the act of October 3, 1917, provides in part as follows: "That from and after the first day of November, 1917, there shall be levied, assessed, collected and paid a tax, equivalent to 10 per cent of any amount paid as dues or membership fees (including initiation fees), to any social, athletic or sporting club or organization, where such dues or fees are in excess of \$12 per year; such taxes to be paid by the person paying such dues or fees."

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WORLD'S OIL WELL RECORD; BUSINESS MUCH A GAMBLE
