HOLD FIVE COLORED WOMEN FOR TRANSPORTING LIQUOR

One Negro Jumps Out of Train Window and Lands Freight and Another is Arrested.

In a raid on an incoming train at the Main Street Station yesterday, Patrolmen Brown and Doeppe, aided by prohibition inspectors, confiscated thirty-seven bottles of whisky and arrested five colored women and a colored man.

One colored man, when he saw the officers approaching, opened a window and leaped from the moving train, putting his head on a freight train on the next track.

One of the "Baltimore jackets" confiscated in the raid contained fifteen pints of whisky.

Those arrested were R. H. Carter, Elizabeth Williams, Lizzie Saunders, Marie Jackson, Ruth Jackson and Mary Brown, all colored. None of them gave Richmond as their home address.

1,140 VIRGINIANS ENLIST AT VARIOUS STATE POSTS

Camp Lee Leads Field in Enrollment Since February 28 With 350.

According to a report issued from the Adjutant-General's office, Washington, which has just been released by the district recruiting office, 829 East Broad Street, there have been 1,140 men enlisted for the regular army at the various camps and military posts in the State of Virginia since February 28 and up to and including May 3.

The regular army in this State, and as a grand total of enlistments since volunteer enlistments were opened in the regular army, Camp Lee is leading the other camps of this State with a total of 350 acceptances.

IS AWARDED SILVER MEDAL FOR TRYING TO SAVE LIFE

Hugh Proctor Sacrificed Himself in Effort to Warn Man From Train.

Hugh F. Proctor, of Clifton, was awarded a silver medal, posthumously, for his heroic deed in saving the life of a man from a train.

Proctor was attempting to warn a man of a train. Snipe did not hear the train approaching and Proctor, in attempting to warn him, was struck and killed. Snipe received injuries which proved fatal.

For saving the life of Edith L. Pullen, at Eagle Rock, in 1917, C. A. Davis, a physician, was awarded a bronze medal and \$100.

CLAIMS CARRANZA TOOK \$19,000,000 FORCIBLY

Manager of Banco de Londres y Mexico Enjoins Montreal Bank.

NEW YORK, May 14.—President Carranza of Mexico, forcibly appropriated \$19,000,000 of the funds of the Banco de Londres y Mexico for his personal use, the charge made by William B. Mitchell, of Long Island, who was formerly manager of the Banco de Londres y Mexico, asks that the Bank of Montreal be enjoined from paying the Mexican government the money deposited there by the Banco de Londres.

WANTS PAYMENT STOPPED

Says Mexican Leader Abrogated All Laws Giving Concessions to Banks of Issue—Protest Results in Harsh Jail Imprisonments.

The Carranza decree gave the banks sixty days in which to increase the metallic reserves to about equal to the amount of circulation, and appointed a board, the commission moneteria, to liquidate the affairs of such banks in the event of their failing to do so.

Mitchell says that he remained in prison with Carranza and other creditors of the Mexican bank, which was the leading financial institution of the city of Mexico.

New York Woman Seeks Injunction to Prevent Invasion of Her Tomb.

NEW YORK, May 14.—Those who quarrel in life shall not sleep together in one mausoleum after death.

This is the gist of the argument in Mathilda Carlson, sixty years old, before Justice Greenbaum of the Supreme Court today, who is seeking to prevent Nils Feggelgren, her nephew, or any other member of his family from being buried in the \$7,000 mausoleum she built in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Her nephew and his family are very much alive, but, according to the affidavit of Aunt Mathilda, she knows that they have hopes of being buried in the tomb she and her sister built out of the hard-earned money she made as cook in the family.

Her sister is buried there now, and since the mausoleum was built she has become estranged from her family, and wants the silence of the tomb reserved only for her sister and herself.
