

GOVERNMENT'S RECEPTION WILL DETERMINE TERM Chairman Cummings Says That Success of League Will Prove Big Factor. NATIONAL COMMITTEE MEETS Prominent Democrats Are Bringing Forward the Name of A. Mitchell Palmer as a Presidential Possibility.

CHICAGO, May 28.—President Wilson's candidacy for a third term will be determined largely by the fate of the league of nations, in the opinion of Homer S. Cummings, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, who came to Chicago today to preside at a two day's session of that body.

"While I have no information regarding President Wilson's intentions about becoming a candidate for a third term, I believe the question largely rests on the fate of the league of nations," said Chairman Cummings. "If the league of nations should by any chance be defeated, and this to my mind is unthinkable, the pressure brought to bear on the President to run again would be very great, and I feel certain he would be re-elected. If the league of nations is successful I do not think the pressure would be nearly as great."

Little Gossip Among Leaders. In the absence of definite word from President Wilson on the subject there was the gossip of candidates among the party leaders. The names most frequently mentioned are William G. McAdoo, former Secretary of the Treasury and A. Mitchell Palmer, who will address the committee tomorrow.

Every State was represented by a committee member or a proxy when Chairman Cummings called the body to order in a session which formally marks the opening of the presidential campaign of 1920.

Chairman Cummings praised the record of progressive achievements of the Democratic national administration, and declared that the Republican party leadership as indicated by the recent organization of Congress, has urged a closer co-operation between the different departments of the party organization in preparing for the next national campaign and referred to the important part women will take in future political activities. He said he expected to visit every important State in the Union before returning to New York August 1. He said the party headquarters would remain in Washington until the opening of the 1920 campaign, when they would be removed to New York. It was probably he said, that a sub-headquarters would be opened in Chicago and perhaps other cities later in a few days he will appoint a number of committees to take up active work for the next presidential campaign.

Open Campaign for 1920. This meeting today marks the opening of an active and militant campaign for 1920, said Chairman Cummings. In addressing the committee, "We are able to point with pride to the record of President Wilson and the Democratic national administration in the matter of progressive legislation."

The selection of the meeting place of the next Democratic national convention was informally discussed by the committeemen, although the question will not be decided until next winter. Thus far the contest appears to be between Cleveland and Indianapolis. A delegation from Indianapolis, led by E. G. Hoffman, national committeeman; Frederick Van Noy, state chairman; and Thomas Taggart, came to Chicago today to urge the claims of Indianapolis.

Make Treaty Party Issue. J. Bruce Kremer, of Montana, vice-chairman of the committee, said the Democrats would welcome the opportunity to make the peace treaty and the league of nations convention the issue in the next presidential campaign.

Democratic party, he said, had fulfilled all its pre-election pledges. He welcomed the advent of women into party politics and said that the votes of women in the Western suffrage States were largely responsible for Democratic success in 1918. The West was at heart as Democratic today as it was in 1916, but it needed to be communicated with and told of the party's record of progressive achievements. Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, of Texas, speaking for the women associate members of the committee, said the Democratic Congress made a blunder when it failed to adopt the woman suffrage constitutional amendment, and that the committee would admit it. Woman suffrage, she said, would be passed by Congress in a few days, and she suggested that the various legislatures be called in special session to ratify the amendment so women could vote for President in 1920. The committee is considering holding its next meeting in January, 1920, at San Francisco.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Applications for transportation for members of the immediate families of officers and men on duty in France and Germany under a plan announced today by the War Department. It also is required that the period of duty to which the men are assigned be sufficient to justify members of their families joining them.
