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PLAN SERMON IN BALLOON AT METHODIST CENTENARY

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CASUALTIES NOW 289,016; 33,754 KILLED IN ACTION

Latest Report of War Department Indicates A. E. F. Losses Include 75,662 Dead.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Total casualties of the American expeditionary forces reported to date were announced today by the War Department as 289,016, including: Killed in action (including 381 lost at sea), 33,754; died of wounds, 13,570; died of disease, 23,396; died from accidents and other causes, 4,942. Total deaths, 75,662.

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BRING ARCHANGEL TROOPS

Last of American Soldiers in Northern Russia Arrive on Two Transports at Brest.

BREST, June 24.—The transports Annoniee and Porto arrived here at noon today, bringing from Archangel the last of the American troops there, except engineers left to clean up the American base.

Brigadier-General W. P. Richardson, commander of the American forces in Northern Russia, was aboard the Porto.

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CELEBRATE HUN DECISION TO ACCEPT ALLIES' TERMS

News That Germany Will Sign Treaty Signal for Demonstrations in French Cities.

PARIS, June 24.—Celebrations over the German decision to sign the treaty of peace without reservations were nowhere more enthusiastic than at Lille and other cities and towns in territory wrested from the Germans.

Newspapers printed special editions, cheering crowds paraded the streets, and houses were decked with allied flags.

At Toulon, Brest and other naval ports, warships announced the news to the people by firing salutes of twenty-one guns.

In all the cities government buildings were illuminated. In Paris the City Hall was brilliantly lighted, and in the square before it and in other open spaces improvised jazz bands appeared and informal dancing was not authorized except on July 14.

The news was announced in all theaters and motion picture houses tonight, the bands striking up the allied anthems amid the cheers of the audiences.

MANY GERMAN SHIPS ARE BEACHED AT SCAPA FLOW

LONDON, June 24.—Three of the German warships which their crews attempted to sink at Scapa Flow Saturday have been beached, and the Baden is moored in readiness for today. There is every prospect of salvaging the ships in good condition if the necessary apparatus arrives before bad weather sets in. The ships beached are the cruisers Emden, Frankfurt and Nürnberg.

Two destroyers and eight torpedo boats have been beached. It is thought there is no prospect of saving the other destroyers without elaborate preparations.
