BARNES WINS WESTERN

EQUALS WORLD RECORD IN GOLF TITLE PLAY

HARRY HAMPTON TIES WITH CHAMPION HAGEN FOR SEVENTH PLACE, WITH 202 STROKES.

CLEVELAND, July 25.—Equaling the world's record of 288 strokes for an open golf championship, James Barnes, of Sunset Hill Club, St. Louis, today won the Western open golf championship from 130 leading golfers of America over the 6,200-yard links of the Mayfield Country Club, leading Leo Diegel, of Detroit, by three strokes and Jack Hutchinson, of Chicago, by four. Barnes also earned the distinction of being the only one to win the title three times. He won in 1914 at Interlachen Club, Minneapolis, and in 1917 at Westmoreland Club, Chicago, where he set the lowest score recorded for seven-year-olds in 1915 on account of the war.

CORBETT SAYS MAN'S GOOD JOCKEYS FORCED FROM TRACK BY OLD RULES.

MIRE BOYS NOW PILOTING

Speedy Animals Often Lose Because of Inefficient Guiding Brought About by Inexperienced Talent. Hurts Running Events.

NEW YORK, July 25.—It seems strange that those who have the interests of horse racing at heart do not attempt to force through a rule to increase the weights that a horse must carry. Such a course would permit the employment of experienced jockeys who now are out of the game because they are too bulky. The standard of racing in this country is increased immeasurably, and there would not be so many weird contests as now feature the turf when apprentice boys are astride. The saddest feature about the turf game here is the fact that just as soon as a jockey learns his business he is forced out of it by the weight rule. Under the existing laws in the United States, which are radically different from those in Europe, the majority of horses in this country carry little more than a feather on their backs. The tendency of the colts is to throw a horse into the race with as low a weight as possible rather than to race him sufficiently to enable a full-blooded jockey to be aboard, thus assuring a well run race. Here we have the case of Johnny Loftis, America's greatest jockey. Jimmy Bitwell, Lawrence Lyke and a pretentious score of others who made a fortune in their youth, but through the years they learned their lesson and now their horses have developed to a point where they are really marvels in their ability to carry heavy loads. But each of them gets only a few mounts each week, simply because most of them cannot scale less than 12 or 15 pounds, and the average weight horse is asked to carry is well below that mark. Some of the racing officials in the United States will wake up to the fact that permitting horses to go into races carrying 88, 90, 92, 102, 105, 108 and 110 pounds is a foolish practice. It permits nothing but mere boys to ride. And then they will hit the weights and boom racing still more.—Copyright 1919.
