Rev. Russell Cecil, D. D., to Make
Brief Address in Byrd
Park.

SOLO BY HENRI BEAUGARD

Professor Moses Stein's Band of
Twenty-Five Pieces Will Play
Fourteen Selections—Program of
Songs.

Rev. Russell Cecil, D. D., pastor of the
Second Presbyterian Church, will
speak at the outdoor band concert and
community "sing" in Byrd Park this
afternoon at 5 o'clock, under the aus-
pices of the War Camp Community
Service. Dr. Cecil's seven-minute talk
will come during the intermission
between the two sections of the band
concert program.

This concert will be the third in the
series of six which will be given on
Sunday afternoons at Byrd Park. It
was postponed from last Sunday be-
cause of rain. Dr. Cecil, however, will
be the first of the "seven-minute men"
to be given a place in the program, but
this feature will be continued, and
prominent Richmond men will speak at
the concert.

Henri Beaugard, song and cheer
leader of the War Camp Community,
will sing a solo, "Dear Old Pal of Mine," as the
fourth number. Professor Moses
Stein's band of twenty-five pieces will
play fourteen selections, and will also
play for the community "sing," which
Mr. Beaugard will direct. Well-known

in order that all of the audience may
take part.

ARREST TOKYO SOCIALISTS

Associated Labor Union Meeting in
Japan Is Broken Up by
Police.

TOKYO, Wednesday, July 23.—A big
mass-meeting of the newly organized
Associated Labor Union, called to dis-
cuss improvement in labor conditions,
and which was addressed by Mayor
Tagiri, of Tokyo, and others, was
broken up violently today when Sakai
Ouzi, a prominent Socialist, tried to
address the audience.

The police interfered and stopped the
meeting. After the disorder four So-
cialists were arrested, but were released
later.

AGREE ON ALCOHOL CONTENT

Senate Committee Approves Provision
of House Prohibition Enforcement

one-half of 1 per cent.

MINERS NEXT TO ACT.

Yorkshire Association Members Must
Consider Federation and Gov-
ernment's Agreement.

LEEDS, ENGLAND, July 26.—The
agreement reached yesterday in the
coal strike between the government
and the miners' federation will have to
be considered by members of the York-
shire Miners' Association, those chiefly
involved, for final action, it was an-
nounced here today by Herbert Smith,
president of the Yorkshire Miners' As-
sociation.

Apart from the wage question, he
said, there were several other matters
in dispute in Yorkshire, especially in
West Yorkshire, which must be settled
before the men go back to work.

REDS CONTINUE TO EXECUTE
FORMER RUSSIAN OFFICERS

Many Escape Into Finland, Some Hid-
ing in Cottages to Evade
Pursuit.

HELSINGFORS, July 26.—Russian
army officers, formerly with the imper-
ial army, are still being executed in
Russia.

This word is brought here by several
officers who formerly were connected
with the imperial organization. These
men have reached Finland after hair-
breadth escapes. They declare they
evaded their pursuers by hiding in cot-
tages.

Word was also brought that Pushtoff
gunworks, which was Russia's
largest, has been shut down and that
other factories are suspending.

The officers arriving here believe the
Bolshevik resistance will be greatly
weakened through Admiral Kolchak's
cutting transport by way of the Veica
and General Denekine's advance, which
is cutting off a further avenue of sup-
plies.

ASK FELLOW PROTESTANTS
TO SPARE HOHENZOLLERN

German Churchmen Appeal to French
Brethren in Vain for
William.

PARIS, July 26.—The Temps today
publishes a note which the Protes-
tant federation of France had address-
ed to President Poincare in answer
to a letter sent him a few days ago
by the Protestant committee of Ber-
lin asking "Democratic France to right
its wrongs toward the Huguenots
driven from France in 1685 by sparing
their benefactors, the Hohenzollerns."

The French Protestants express
regret that the Berlin Protes-
tants can raise their voices in favor
of the former German Emperor in an
attempt to protect him from having
to face the verdict of the civilized
nations.

REPRESENT NEW PROVINCE

Decide Fourteen Senators From Alsace-
Lorraine Shall Sit in French
Chamber.

PARIS, Friday, July 25.—Fourteen
Senators from Alsace-Lorraine will sit
in the French Parliament, it was an-
nounced by Rene Viviani, president of
the Chamber of Deputies' peace com-
mission, at a meeting of the commis-
sion this afternoon.

In accordance with the French elec-
toral laws Alsace-Lorraine, with a
population of 1,500,000, would have
twenty-four Deputies.
