

HARDING WILL FEATURE TARIFF ON LABOR DAY

Will Later Discuss Agriculture and League of Nations at Minnesota Fair Grounds.

FIRST TRIP OUT OF STATE

Republican Nominee Makes Leisurely Trip to Minneapolis, Stopping for Conferences En Route—Tariff Question Will Be Emphasized.

MARION, OHIO, August 14.—Labor, the league of nations agricultural issues and the tariff, are to be made headlines of Senator Harding's campaign during early September under a program revealed here today in connection with announcement of definite plans for the Republican nominee's first speech outside of Ohio.

The labor address will be delivered on Labor Day, Monday, September 6, probably from the farm porch. No deliberation has been looked for so far to call on that day, but it is understood a number of labor organizations have asked for the appointment.

Agriculture and the league of nations are to be coupled in an address on September 8 at the Minnesota State Fair grounds between Minneapolis and St. Paul.

In announcing plans for the trip, which will be Senator Harding's first speaking excursion outside his own state since his nomination, he said no other speeches would be made along the way, and that his decision to go to Minnesota was in no sense a modification of his front-porch program.

To Emphasize Tariff. No definite date has been set for a discussion of the tariff, but the nominee recently made plain his purpose to emphasize it as his campaign develops. He said he expected to see a lot of shouting about the tariff soon, and that he would advocate a protective schedule worked out by Congress in cooperation with the Tariff Commission.

Senator Harding plans to make his trip to Minneapolis leisurely, leaving here on the night of September 6 and stopping on the way for political conferences. He doesn't expect to travel by special train or private car, but will have an ordinary sleeping car reserved for himself and party.

The State Fair officials originally had asked the candidate make his speech there on Labor Day, but he set September 8, because of his desire to remain here for a Labor Day speech. He said his acceptance of the Minnesota invitation would include any possibility of his going to other Western fairs, and added that the trip to Minnesota was under consideration since the second day after his nomination.

Will Discuss League. While this speech is to be devoted primarily to agriculture, the candidate expects to include an elaboration of the foreign policy he announced in his speech of acceptance. It is believed that he will also note of recent Democratic utterances on the league of nations and in reply will carry a step further his proposal for peace by resolution and for an international association not imposing American independence.

In outlining today his tariff views, Senator Harding expressed the opinion that the tariff Commission is "not functioning" to its fullest possibilities, and said he believed it could be made an important help in farming "not an old-time prohibitive tariff, but a tariff which protects American interests."

Tariff Question an Issue. "Mark my words," said the nominee, "this tariff question will be an issue. People can smile now, but you will hear a lot of shouting about the tariff before this campaign is over."

"I do not know whether I am in agreement with others on this, but I favor a tariff commission. No Congress can have all the information necessary as to differentials and rates. I regard a tariff commission as a necessary adjunct to a protective Congress, an adjunct to protective policy."

How can it be otherwise? Europe is bound to make every possible effort to rehabilitate her trade. There is only one way she can do this. We are the best buyers. America is the chief nation to have a reactive market, outside of Japan and Spain."

Most of this morning Senator Harding spent in answering various party questions. Senator Weeks is expected to have a large part in the campaign, and it was said many questions of policy were taken up in their discussion. Another caller was Representative today from the State of Ohio. In the afternoon the nominee closed shop and went for a motor ride.


"My reason for saying this is not founded on any logical reasoning, but because I have received a hunch that we may expect his cooperation," said Mr. White.
