

DISCOVERY OF NEW STAR EXPLAINED BY PROFESSOR

Dr. Olivier, of University of Virginia, Issues Statement About Latest Planet.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA., August 28.—Professor Charles P. Olivier, of the Leander McCormick Observatory at the University of Virginia, gave out the following statement today regarding the newly discovered star in the constellation Cygnus: "Dense clouds prevented its observation at the McCormick Observatory until the night of August 24. The nova was then magnitude 2.1, and had been growing brighter. Observations on August 25 gave its magnitude as 2.4, and on August 26 as 2.8, proving that it was on the wane. On August 26 plates were also taken with the great twenty-six-inch telescope, which will eventually be used to determine the star's parallel, i. e., its distance from us. While a full year is needed to secure the necessary data to determine this distance, we are fairly safe in saying the outbursts actually took place several centuries ago, and the great increase of brilliancy, which brings us the message of the catastrophe, has only reached us in 1920.

"Although the causes of such sudden outbursts, which make stars 10,000 times brighter in a few days or even hours, are not well understood as yet, it seems clear that the theory of a collision is the most probable. Internal explosions might account for some cases. "The nova is situated in the northern part of the constellation of the Northern Cross. It crosses the meridian now about 10 P. M., some 15 degrees north of our zenith. Its brilliancy will probably decrease slowly, but it should still be visible to the eye for several weeks at least."

TWO SEPARATE SCHOOLS FOR DEAF MUTES IS PLAN

H. M. McManaway Says Staunton Institution Is Overcrowded—Richmond Addressed Convention. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA., Aug. 28.—The Virginia Association for the Deaf held a business session this morning, at which the annual address of the president, A. G. Tucker, of Richmond, was delivered, reports heard, and committees appointed. An inspection of the school was also made by the visitors during the morning. This afternoon the annual field day exercises were held on the lawn in the rear of the school.

H. M. McManaway, superintendent of the Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind, strongly urged the association to interest itself in bringing about the division of the Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind into two separate schools. He called attention to the fact that last year there were twenty-five counties in the State that were not represented among the student body of the Virginia School for the Deaf and Blind, indicating that the school had not yet reached its maximum efficiency. He further stated that it would probably be necessary to turn away students this year, owing to the crowded conditions brought on by having two schools in one.

Ship Herd to Carolina. (Special to The Times-Dispatch.) FREDERICKSBURG, VA., August 28.—Captain M. B. Howe, of Fredericksburg, shipped six high-class registered Jersey cows from his Brompton Farms to a party in North Carolina. They were Fernia Pretty Lusira, Stockwell's Sweet Violet, Bonnie Royal Lady, Brompton's Golden Juno, Violet's Jewel of B. Stockwell's Sylvania. The cattle will be used for breeding purposes. The above is one among a number of shipments of small herds which Captain Howe has sold and shipped to parties at various points recently. Some of them were to be used as the foundation for herds for breeding farms. Among purchasers of Brompton Jerseys during the past few weeks was the United States government.


