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BROOKLYN DODGERS LOSE TO NEW YORK GIANTS

World's Series Conditions Prevailed During Game—Thousands Turned Away.

BARNES PITCHED GREAT BALL

[By Associated Press.] BROOKLYN, Sept. 25.—New York won the first game of the series with Brooklyn here today.

The game was played under world's series conditions, with an attendance that taxed every bit of available space at Ebbets' Field. The gates were closed at all, except those holding reserved seats an hour before the game started.

Notwithstanding the defeat today, Brooklyn needs only to win two more games to clinch the pennant, and this can be accomplished by taking the two from New York or one from the Giants and the final game to be played with Boston.

New York scored today in four innings, and made at least one hit in every inning. McGraw's men started after Grimes in the first inning. With Burns disposed of, Bancroft hit a triple down the right-field line and scored a moment later on a wild pitch.

New York—Burns out. Kidduff to Konechey. Bancroft hit down the right field line for three bases. Bancroft scored on a wild pitch.


