

SAYS PEOPLE NOT ALIVE TO THEIR DUTY TO CITY

Superintendent Cohn Reviews Physical Accomplishments of His Department.

FORWARDS REPORT TO MAYOR Collecting Ashes and Trash Costs 81 Cents Per Capita, or More Than Any Work Done by Bureau.

Superintendent Henry J. Cohn's annual report for the last year, which has just been printed, carries an interesting review of the physical accomplishments of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, Department of Public Welfare, together with several recommendations for improvements which are being given due consideration by Welfare Director Levy in connection with the statement he will send to the Mayor of the needs of the department for the year 1921.

None of the duties of this bureau are considered more important than the task of keeping the streets and alleys of the city free from filth and in a sanitary condition. The demand for cleaner streets and alleys is universal, and the people of Richmond are no less exacting than those of other cities.

Flushers have proved to be one of the best of the many innovations in the street cleaning section. The cost of the purchase of an additional machine is what is known as a patrol work. This means that a man is sent on some one-half section of street to patrol with a broom and a pusher.

On the cost of collection of ashes and trash, which is slightly under 81 cents per capita, the report says: "This service cost the city far more than any work done by the bureau of street cleaning. The amount expended in collecting ashes and trash was \$11,762.80, or slightly more than 4 1/2 per cent of the total spent during the year."

W. W. Poindexter Chosen Lieutenant-Colonel and E. W. Bowles Major of Blues' Battalion.

Major J. Fulmer Bright was chosen colonel of the First Regiment, Virginia Infantry, National Guard; Captain W. W. Poindexter, of the Hugh Stockwell Machine Gun and Supply Company, was made lieutenant-colonel of the same regiment, and Major E. W. Bowles was selected as major of the First Battalion Blues' Battery, at a noon held yesterday afternoon in the Blues' armory.

After a meeting Saturday in the Blues' armory a dinner was served in the hall of the Blues' armory. Members of the regiment were the guests of the Blues' armory Saturday evening. General Stern and Governor Davis were the speakers at this occasion.

Following service with the Blues on the Mexican border, Major Bowles was sent by the War Department to the school of musketry at Fort Sill, Okla., for a three months' course of instruction. Here, among 500 regular and National Guard army officers, he made the first standing in weekly examinations in the three months' course.

Major Bowles went with the Virginia Cavalry to Camp McClellan, where he was ordered to the adjutant of the Fifty-fourth Field Artillery Brigade. Owing to his devotion to Virginia troops, he did not accept.

Later Major Bowles was declared a surplus officer of the Blues and transferred to the Mexican border. He was sent with the field artillery brigade later to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, where he was attached to the Field Artillery School.
