Legislative Committee of State Bankers' Association to Prepare New Laws Covering Offense.

SUBMIT TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Imposition of More Severe Sentences May Act as Deterrent, Benefit of Financiers—Plan Group Meetings to Begin in February.
