

NEWS GATHERED FROM ALL PARTS OF VIRGINIA

PRESIDENT WILL MAKE NO POLITICAL SPEECHES

Only Address in Virginia During Campaign Will Be Non-Partisan.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—Congressman C. Bascom Eason, Colonel Henry W. Anderson, of Richmond, Republican candidate for Governor, and State Chairman Joseph L. Crupper called at the White House today and were with President Harding for a short while.

The Virginians went over the situation in Virginia with the President, and it was said that he was very much interested in what the Republican organization was doing in the State and was in full accord with their efforts.

The President will deliver an address at Williams and Mary College, Williamsburg, Va., on October 12, and on the same day probably will attend a centennial celebration at Yorktown. Tentative plans are for a trip to Yorktown on the day following, from which place the President is to motor to Williamsburg. His address there will be nonpartisan.

It has been reported that the Republican organization in the State would ask the President to make some political speeches during the coming campaign, but it was said today that no political addresses would be made by the President.

The delegation told the President that Colonel Anderson would open his campaign on September 5. The Virginians said the President was well pleased with the situation in the State from a Republican standpoint.

HAINES ACCIDENTAL DROWNING VICTIM

Coroner's Jury Renders Verdict as to Death of Haines Apple Buyer.

WINCHESTER, Va., Aug. 17.—The body of Sam Haines, widely known apple buyer and broker, who was drowned Sunday in the Shenandoah River, was this afternoon interred in Mount Hebron Cemetery here, following funeral services at Christ Protestant Episcopal Church, the pastor, the Rev. Robert H. Scott officiating. Whether his body will be removed later to his old home near Winchester, where his associates and relatives are, is not known.

The coroner's jury has rendered a verdict of death by accidental drowning. The body was found caught between jagged rocks in water not more than three feet deep. It is thought he was stricken with heart disease while bathing.

Mr. Haines had been buying apples in the Winchester market for the last twelve or fourteen years. He formerly was in Lockport, N. Y., and New York City, and was widely known among the trade. He was about 51 years old, unmarried, and was eight months in England and married sister at Vancouver, B. C. He was a member of the International Apple Shippers' Association.

VIRGINIAN IS LEFT STRANDED IN SPAIN

Boats Cabled Northern Neck Man Returned, as He Was Not Located.

Rice, who was left stranded in Spain one time ago when his ship sailed about him and carried away his passport and other credentials. Mr. Rice had difficulty in securing another passport from the Spanish government, and notified his parents, who sent a large sum of money by cable. This was later returned, as Mr. Rice could not then be located.

HEAVILY LOADED WAGON PASSES OVER LAD'S BODY

Boy Falls Under Wheels and Is Fatally Hurt on Charlottesville Street.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Aug. 17.—William Randolph Gibson, 14, son of Randolph Gibson, yard brakeman for the Southern Railway, died at an early hour this morning at the University Hospital from the effects of injuries sustained yesterday afternoon in a runaway accident.

The youth, accompanied by his brother Elmer, aged 11, was driving a wagon loaded with railway ties through the city. The horse, becoming frightened, started on a run down a hill. The children were jolted from the wagon and fell under the wheels, two of which passed over his chest and abdomen. Though mortally injured, the lad jumped to his feet and ran to the sidewalk, where he was caught by a bystander just before he collapsed.

At the hospital blood transfusion was resorted to without avail, in an effort to save the boy's life. The father furnished the blood. Besides his parents, the youth is survived by four brothers and three sisters. The funeral will be held Thursday afternoon at St. John's Episcopal Church, near the Miller School.

PETERSBURG PLANS LARGE BOND ISSUE

Major Part of Proceeds Will Be Used to Refund Paper Soon Due.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) PETERSBURG, Va., Aug. 17.—Preliminary steps were taken by the City Council last night for the largest bond issue in the city's history. It will be for \$200,000 for \$1,000,000 in 10-year bonds. The city manager, Brownlow, can arrange the sale at not more than 5 per cent interest.

The decision to issue the long-term bonds, which will mature in not less than fifteen or more than forty years, came as a surprise as the Council had given no inkling of its intentions. The principal reason for the authorizing the city manager to enter into negotiations was due to the fact that it will be necessary to refund an issue of \$200,000, 4 per cent short-term notes on December 1, and \$200,000 worth of 6 per cent short-term notes due on January 22, 1922.

SOUTHWEST B VILLAGE AT HOPEWELL IS SOLD

Deal Amounts to More Than \$100,000 and Covers 157 Houses and 43 Acres.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) HOPEWELL, Va., Aug. 17.—The largest real estate deal of the season was made today. Southwest "B" Village, containing 157 houses and forty-three acres of land, was sold through the Broyhill Camp Realty Company, of Hopewell, by the Dupont Chemical Company. The deal, amounting to over \$100,000, is the largest single real estate deal closed by or through a local realty concern in the history of Hopewell.

The houses are all new and have never been occupied, and were completed after the signing of the armistice. The houses each have six rooms and bath and are equipped with all modern conveniences. A few minor repairs will be made on the buildings, and adjoining streets and the houses will be placed on the market on the 15th of next month, and also rented at a reasonable rate.

The location of the property is admirable since it adjoins the Tabize Artificial Silk Company on the west, and lies between the Petersburg-Hopewell car line and the Norfolk and Western tracks, and is all high and well drained.

A price will be offered for the most appropriate name for the suburb. Friends of Hopewell declare this deal is enough to convince the people not alone of the revival of real estate in this section, but of the future of Hopewell and to show them that it only requires patience and push to see Hopewell one of the "great cities" of the South, as has been prophesied by some of the plant heads.

4,500 TREES YIELD BUSHEL OF PEACHES

Albemarle Grower Last Year Shipped 2,000 Crates From Orchard.

(Special to The Times-Dispatch.) CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Aug. 17.—Some idea of the destruction of the fruit crop in this section by the spring freeze may be gathered from the experience of W. H. Mehring, a large grower of peaches in the Covesville neighborhood, twenty miles south of the city.

He has an orchard of 4,500 trees, and last year shipped 2,000 crates of prime fruit to the markets. Recently he visited his orchards on an inspection tour and, with the help of one of his men, brought back a total of one bushel, representing this year's entire yield.
