

DR. WINGFIELD LAUDED FOR HIS WORK IN GREECE

Family of Richmond Physician, Who Died of Burns, Receives Cablegram.

The family of Dr. Russell S. Wingfield, of Richmond, is in receipt of the following cablegram from Ernest P. Hekel, American Red Cross Commissioner to Europe, in Paris, relative to the death of Dr. Wingfield, as the result of burns received in a fire at the Red Cross child health center at Saloniki, Greece:

"In behalf of the American Red Cross, I wish to express the profound sorrow which is felt by all members of the organization for the tragic accident which caused the death of Dr. Russell S. Wingfield while engaged in the discharge of his duties at his post near Saloniki on August 20. Dr. Wingfield made a brave struggle for life, and for several days we were hopeful that he would survive, but on August 20 he sank rapidly and his death quickly followed. It will comfort you to know that his work was of a high order and that his personality had won the devotion of his associates. Your desire that the body should be shipped home will be carried out with the least possible delay."

It is not known when the body will reach America, but it will be returned for burial here in the city. Hundreds of letters and telegrams of a sympathetic nature have been received by the parents from the college chums of the dead surgeon.

Dr. Wingfield on August 13 received the burns to which he succumbed a week later.

during the afternoon by reports from Williamson, Mingo County, and Welch, McDowell County, that Sheriff Don Chalm, of Logan County, had sent out a hurried call for assistance, and that forces of the State police and deputies had been hurried to Logan by automobile expecting to arrive there late today.

As all information reaching government sources from Logan County was to the effect that the situation there was quiet, this movement of re-enforcements was not explained until it became known in Welch after Sheriff Hatfield and his men had departed for Logan, that the march had been broken up and the men were on their way home.

The movement of the State police from Williamson was explained by the fact that fears were felt in some quarters that stragglers from the now disbanded "army" might remain in Boone County and the presence of the force would be needed there to help Sheriff Hill and his three or four deputies clear up the situation.

No Official Statement.

There was no official statement on this point but the assumption was borne out by people in Logan County when Captain J. Brockus and his troopers rode through the town on their way to the Boone County border.

The McDowell County force, which had been expected at Logan at 5 o'clock, had not reached there an hour later. The one point in the mining country which has been the source of much anxiety for officials because of its position along the Boone-Logan border was Blair. The miners there are organized and reports have come on two successive nights that fighting was in progress between them and the Logan County authorities. Correspondents with the marching miners were unable to get to Blair from Madison, while Sheriff Hatfield refused any information concerning events in that section. All wire communications have been cut for several days, and some apprehension was felt that the real center of the trouble was at Blair.

This point was cleared up late today when Sheriff Hill, of Boone County, succeeded in getting into communication with personal friends in the town. They told him there had been no disorders of any kind and that Sheriff Chalm's men had not come down the east slope of the mountains. They assured Sheriff Hill, they said, there was no reason why disorders should break out at this time in that vicinity.

From Logan, the county seat of Boone, business and professional men reported that they knew of nothing unusual, and as far as surface indications went, the town and county were quiet. Sheriff Chalm's office pursued its policy up to 4:30 o'clock this afternoon of refusing all news to newspaper men.

DAIL EIREANN MEETS TO ACT ON REPLY

DUBLIN, Aug. 27.—Members of the Irish Republican Parliament met at the Mansion House here today to consider the situation which has developed from the firm stand of Prime Minister Lloyd George relative to a settlement of the Irish controversy. The message from the Prime Minister arrived here last night and its intimation that the British government could not consider any unreasonable delay in continuing negotiations used some apprehension among the people.

Leaders of the Dail Eireann and members of the Cabinet of Eamonn de Valera appeared, however, not to consider that the situation had become any more delicate than it had been since the exchanges began.

Commenting on the letter from Lloyd George, the Freeman's Journal said today: "In our opinion the Prime Minister's latest communication bears the construction which Ian C. Smuts, Premier of the Union of South Africa, put upon the original offer from the British government."

The Irish Independent urged the Prime Minister to readjust or modify the conditions to which Irish leaders have taken exception, and said


