

THE RUINS OF AN ANCIENT ROMAN AMPHITHEATER? Guess again! This wonderful terraced hillside is the birthplace of the marvelous rice fields located in the wildest and most remote mountain regions of Luzon, Philippine Islands. General Wood, our new governor of the Islands, was highly interested in this engineering and agricultural feat of a primitive tribe of Igorrotes. Ingenious canals connect the terraces and provide an equal and regular flow of water for irrigation purposes.

A JAPANESE MASTERPIECE OF WOOD-CARVING. A San Francisco Nipponese, dying of slow tuberculosis, carves from wood this life-size statue of himself—perfect in every minute detail and uncanny in its realism.
