

WILL NAME SUCCESSOR TO CITY ATTORNEY POLLARD

City Council Will Meet in Joint Session Tonight for Purpose.

PROBABLY APPOINT ANDERSON Two Vacancies on School Board Also Will Be Filled—Streets and Finance Committees Are Scheduled to Meet This Evening.

A joint session of City Council will be held tonight at 8 o'clock to act on the resignation of City Attorney Pollard, and to fill two vacancies on the school board.

The general impression is that Assistant City Attorney George Wayne Anderson will be elected City Attorney, and that Mr. Pollard will accept the important position, just created, of Advisory Counsel.

To date, there are no announced candidates for the two vacancies on the school board. Dr. Clifton M. Miller, of the Second District, retires because of his removal from the district, while W. Kirk Mathews, of the Third District, gives stress of business as his reason for retiring from the board.

RICKS SEEKS CLEMENCY FOR DR. W. A. HADLEY

Will Ask Jury to Unite in Petitioning Executive Mercy for Condemned Wife-Slayer.

Clemency for Dr. W. A. Hadley, recently convicted of the murder of his wife and sentenced to die in the electric chair one week from tomorrow, will be sought at a meeting of the jury in the office of Justice J. Hoge Ricks this afternoon.

Justice Ricks, it is understood, will make a statement to the jury in which he will ask the members to unite in a petition to the Governor asking that Dr. Hadley be given life in the prison. Dr. Hadley now is in the detention cell on the death corridor of the penitentiary. Efforts to have the Supreme Court grant Hadley a new trial have been abandoned.
