

REFORM MOVIES, HALT MODERN DANCE, URGED Southern Baptists Make Clear-Cut Presentation of Views.

MOB RULE IS DENOUNCED Southern Convention at Jacksonville Calls for Orderly Enforcement of Law and Fair Trials for Accused Persons.

[By Associated Press.] JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 22.—The Southern Baptist convention voted final adjournment at 12:20 P. M. today after adopting the report of the social service commission denouncing mob rule, expelling the conviction that moving picture shows must be "cleaned up or destroyed," and making many other recommendations.

Efforts were made to amend the report to put the convention on record as denouncing the present "commercialized motion picture industry," instead of seeking reform of certain features of it, but these failed, and the chief amendment adopted was one denouncing alleged efforts of certain sections of the social press to "liberalize enforcement of the prohibition laws."

As to Law Enforcement. Under the head of law enforcement, the commission said: "It cannot help, it can only hurt, for individuals to take the enforcement of law and the administration of justice into their own hands. To do so would be a double crime, a crime against the individual sought to be punished and a crime against society and government as a whole. Under the principles of the American government every man charged with crime is guaranteed a fair trial in open court by a jury of his peers, with the right of calling witnesses to his defense and having all the facts fully and judicially considered. Any other procedure is mob rule, and if adopted, will generally ultimately undermine and overthrow everything we hold dear. Public meetings may be called, in many instances ought to be called, and every citizen should stand out openly for fundamental American principles."

Must Hold to Fundamentals. "Your commission feels," the report continued, "that we cannot too strongly urge upon our pastors and churches the importance of holding to the coming allied with or giving approval and support to any movement or organization that violates or tends to violate these sacred and fundamental principles."

Referring to the appointment of Will H. Hays as head of the Motion Picture Producers' Association, the report, which was one of the final matters before the business session of the convention, expressed the hope that Mr. Hays "will exercise what is supposed to be his great power for a thorough clean-up in the whole picture business."

The commission expressed approval of the banning of the "Party" at the University of Virginia, and declared "more is needed. It will take a flood of sunlight to purify the region."

"We hope Mr. Hays and the producers will keep up the work of the party," the report said. "Regardless of what they do, we must demand the enactment of laws for strict censorship in each state. The morals of our young people must not continue to be corrupted by the public exhibition of the eternal triangle and other displays of indecency and lust."

Modern Dance Again Scored. "In our last annual report, speaking of the modern dance and its increasing prevalence following the war, we said: 'Another gross and growing evil must be mentioned. It is the modern dance, one of the most serious and menacing by-products of the world war is the great increase in the dance evil and the extravagant extremes to which it has gone. Accompanied, as it is by immodest dress, by close physical contact of the sexes, by its lack of restraint, it is undoubtedly doing much to undermine the morals of our young people. It is beyond question that in many cases it leads to moral wreck and ruin. The time has come when, from every pulpit strong and persistent protest must be made and wise and faithful teaching must be given. The time has come when our churches, as such, must take a positive position against the corrupt and corrupting evil. Undoubtedly the parents are largely responsible. Your commission would appeal to all possible emphasis to all our people, especially to the pastors and parents, that this growing menace shall be checked and abolished.'"

"We are glad to record some improvements in conditions. Many secular papers and class publications have come out in strong condemnation of the excesses of the present-day dance, if not of the dance as such, which re-enforces us in our position; we must not slacken our efforts."

Remove Faithless Officers. Immediate removal of prohibition officers who fail to enforce the law was asked in the report, which also declared that replies from Congressmen indicate they would find a way to prevent establishment of "recreation" rum ships just outside the three-mile limit.

NEW PRINCIPLES IN RAIL RATES ARE ENUNCIATED Significant Hearing on Southern Freight Charges Opens in Atlanta.

[By Associated Press.] ATLANTA, Ga., May 22.—Declaring that the present hearing by the Interstate Commerce Commission, which began here today, into interstate class rates in Southeastern territory, was in his opinion, the most important to Southern carriers ever held by the commission, E. M. Goodwyn, freight traffic manager of the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, occupied the afternoon session in tracing the history of Southern railroads, development of their systems and rate making in this territory.

At the opening of the session Joseph R. Eastman, of the Interstate Commerce Commission, who is directing the hearing, announced that the purpose of the investigation was to secure greater harmony between interstate and State structures in the territory including the States of Virginia, the Carolinas, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee and Kentucky.

Mr. Goodwyn outlined a proposed system for fixing rates in the territory, which included the following principles: A mileage system as the rock-bottom of all rate fixing. A fixed definite percentage relationship between class rates, which will mean that every railroad will be called upon to completely change its present system of rates. Application of class rates in all directions.

CONDITION OF HIGHWAYS LEADING INTO RICHMOND

Issued for Benefit of Multitude of Visitors Who Will Attend Pageant.

Information yesterday by G. T. Lemmon, district engineer, State Highway Department, for the benefit of the public that will come to Richmond during Pageant Week as to the condition of the main highways leading into Richmond follows:

River Road from Richmond, west, from Fork Union to Dogtown.—This road is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in very good condition, and is passable. If there is very much rain, however, trouble may be expected between Fork Union and Dogtown. From Dogtown to Richmond.—This road is in excellent condition and should remain so unless we have excessive rains.

Three-Chopt Road.—This is a county road and is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in fair condition, and no trouble need be expected as long as the weather remains fair.

Road to Rockville.—This is a county road and is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in very good condition, and should remain in this condition as long as the weather is fair.

Mountain Road.—From Glen Allen to Montpelier.—This is a county road and is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in very good condition, and no trouble should be expected as long as the weather is fair.

Charlottesville Road.—From Louisa to Charlottesville.—This road is unpaved and rough, but passable. If there is very much rain, trouble may be expected on this section. From Pendleton to Richmond, via Negroville.—This road is maintained by the State Highway Department, and is in excellent condition, and should remain in this condition unless we have excessive rains.

Richmond—Washington Highway.—This road is maintained by the State Highway Department, and is in excellent condition. No trouble need be expected on this road.

Telegraph Road.—This is a county highway, maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in very good condition, and no trouble need be expected.

Second Street Road.—This is a county highway and is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in very good condition, and no trouble need be expected, provided the weather remains fair.

Croighton Road.—From Manquin to Chickahominy River.—This road is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but it is in fair condition, and no trouble need be expected provided the weather stays fair.

From Chickahominy River to Richmond.—This road is maintained by the State Highway Department and is in very good condition, and no trouble need be expected unless we have excessive rains.

Nine-Mile Road.—From Seven Pines to Richmond.—This road is a county highway and is not maintained by the State, but is in very good condition, and no trouble should be expected.

Williamsburg Road.—From Toano to Richmond.—This is a county highway and is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in fair condition from Toano to Henrico County line, and no trouble need be expected as long as the weather remains fair.

From Henrico County line to Richmond.—This is a gravel road, and it is in excellent condition.

Charles City Road.—From Williamsburg to Richmond.—This road has just recently been put in very good condition with the expectation of

Food Hook Road.—This is a county road and is not maintained by the State Highway Department, but is in very good condition, and no trouble need be expected.

Gods Bridge Road.—From Burkeville to Richmond.—This road is eight miles of this road from Burkeville to Jetersville is under construction at the present time and is very rough. This road is maintained by the State Highway Department and is in excellent condition, and no trouble should be expected unless we have excessive rains.


