

DR. POTEAT TO PREACH AT UNIVERSITY TODAY

President of Wake Forest College Will Deliver Baccalaureate Sermon.

TRIP BEGINS U. OF R. FINALS Students, Faculty and Friends of Institution Make Pilgrimage to Jamestown-Merger to Be Discussed by Board of Trustees.

Commencement exercises closing the nineteenth session of the University of Richmond began yesterday when the steamship gratitude carried a capacity crowd of faculties, students and friends of the local institution to Jamestown. This morning at 11 o'clock Dr. W. L. Poteat, president of Wake Forest College, N. C., will preach the annual baccalaureate sermon in the auditorium at Westhampton. Dr. Poteat, who arrived yesterday evening at the home of Mr. P. W. Boatwright, president of the University of Richmond, announced that he would speak this morning on the subject, "Adventure and Victory," using as his text, "It does not yet appear what we shall be." (1 John III, 2.)

An academic procession in which will be the large faculty of the university and the exceptionally large senior class, and distinguished visitors, will precede the 11 o'clock services. As usual, many worshipers from the city will go to Westhampton for the annual collegiate sermon.

Religious Functions Today. The whole of today is given over to religious functions, with an annual open-air temperance service at twilight this evening. This service will take place in the cloister at Westhampton College, and Dr. Solon Cousins, of the Second Baptist Church, will speak.

Yesterday's sail to Jamestown was one of the several functions on the commencement program that are fostered by students. Tomorrow night at 8:30 o'clock the student Dramatic Clubs of the university will present Shakespeare's "As You Like It." This will also be held in the open and the general public will be

the guests of the University of Richmond on this occasion, as on all commencement occasions.

Students, past and present, will have a large part in the proceedings of Tuesday, when a full day of alumni and alumnae activities will occur. They will observe their traditional breakfasts and dinners, and will stage a water pageant and sing on the large university lake. Again on Wednesday, students will hold presentimental places as they receive the university honors and diplomas.

The alumni committee in charge of the annual reunion has arranged to register all alumni in the university library, which will be kept open throughout the commencement week. Alumni registration will start tomorrow morning there and at the cafeteria late Tuesday afternoon, the checks being made to check the numerous alumni who will not reach the campus until time for the alumni banquet at 6:30 o'clock Tuesday evening.

To Take Up Medical Merger. At a meeting of the executive committee of the board of trustees, yesterday, of which T. C. Williams, Jr., is chairman, many matters of interest were discussed, which will be released following the meeting Tuesday morning of the full board of trustees. The much-discussed medical college merger was only informally mentioned. However, officials of the university are contemplating a more or less formal discussion of the question at the board of trustees' gathering.

BUSY WEEK IS AHEAD FOR SONS OF VETERANS' CAMPS

Multitude of Activities Will Be Marked Chiefly by Intensive Campaign for 2,000 New Members and Completion of Reunion Program.

A multitude of activities will mark the week opening tomorrow for the Sons of Confederate Veterans Camps here, featured chiefly by a remarkable drive toward a 2,000 membership goal and the completion of the annual convention of the United Sons of Confederate Veterans in Richmond at the City Auditorium, June 19 to 22, inclusive. The outstanding social function in connection with the campaign is the Confederate ball next Friday night at the Jefferson Hotel, sponsored by the Daughters of the Confederacy chapter, R. E. Lee No. 1 and Stonewall Jackson No. 981, Sons' Camps, at which the war period costume and fancy dress will be observed. Mrs. John Frederick Bauer is general chairman of the various chapter committees in charge of the ball. Assisting her are the following: Mrs. Norman V. Handolph, Richmond Chapter, Daughters of the Confederacy; Miss Mary Bell Perkins, R. E. Lee Camp patroness, and

formed at the joint luncheon Tuesday at 1 o'clock at the Richmond Hotel. The "Membership Day" to be set aside by the State's chief executive and the head of the city's government will give added impetus to the efforts to reach the 2,000 goal. A message received yesterday by Carl Hinton, adjutant-general of the United Sons, from the Sons Camp at Dallas, Tex., stated that 1,000 had been brought into membership within one week and that the camp had been completely transformed from "a dead one" into an active organization. "The camp expects to be well represented at the reunion in Richmond," Commander Robert E. Eagon wrote Mr. Hinton.

Reports are being received at the headquarters here daily of the enthusiasm evidenced in the coming reunion, indicating that many thousand Sons will assemble here from all over the Southland and participate in the events. Coming with the camp representatives will be at least three pretty girls, a sponsor, a maid of honor and others, chosen by each camp. Tickets will be placed on sale early in the week by members of the Daughters of the Confederacy, officials in charge announced last night. Tomorrow night the Sons of R. E. Lee Camp will admit a large number of new members and a committee of five will be appointed by their commander to hold a conference with a committee named last Friday night by Commander Walter L. Hopkins, of Stonewall Jackson Camp, and petition Governor E. Lee Trinkle and Mayor George Ainslie to issue a proclamation designating one day between that time and the reunion as "Membership Day." The petition will be made Tuesday. Although new members are being obtained daily by the campaign committees, the full drive will be launched next week, following plans
