

LEADERS FEAR SLEMP WILL BE NAMED AGAIN

Some Delegates Hope to Force
Congressman Into
Candidacy.

EFFORT TO HALT MOVEMENT

[Special to The Times-Dispatch.]
PULASKI, Va., July 25.—The movement for a second time to elect a Congressman from this district is being opposed by some of the delegates to the district convention to be held in Bristol Thursday, August 3.

This is the question that has arisen in the last twenty-four hours to disconcert Republican leaders in the district. Leaders who came here last night to attend a meeting of the district committee admitted that rumors of a second Slemm nomination have been heard in many parts of the district since the Congressman declined to run to the will of the Norton convention.

Today more reports of delegates still in favor of nominating Slemm were heard in Bristol. Many of the delegates believe that a second nomination will carry obligations which the Congressman will be unable to carry. In an editorial today the Times in an editorial today declared that Slemm's nomination here August 3 is assured in the light of events of the past two days.

Leaders are now considering plans which will head off the movement for a second Slemm nomination. Many of them are openly alarmed over the prospects.

C. & O. CLERKS ON JOB, DESPITE STRIKE CALL

NORFOLK, Va., July 25.—Reports from Richmond that Chesapeake and Ohio clerks at Norfolk and Newport News would strike today were confirmed. Clerks at the offices of the company here and at Newport News remained at work as usual.

H. J. Osborn, general chairman of the clerks' brotherhood, was authorized for the prediction that the walk-out would take place here.

Officers of the clerks' union here refused to comment on the Richmond report. Two prospects were that there would be no change in the line-up at this point as it is understood that the majority of the clerks here are determined to stay at work.

HELD ON CHARGE TRANSPORTING STILL

LYNCHBURG, Va., July 25.—J. V. Crawford, who lives in the suburbs of Lynchburg, has been held for the September grand jury in the Circuit Court of Campbell County on the charge of transporting a 35-gallon still. County Officer Childers caught Crawford moving the outfit after watching it a day and two nights, and, after his arrest, Crawford claimed he was stealing the still, according to Officer Childers. About twenty-five gallons of mash, a still furnace were destroyed by the officer.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., July 25.—Mrs. John Morris, of New Bedford, Mass., came to this county two weeks ago to visit her grandparents. Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Morris, near this city, bringing with her her 3-month-old baby boy, John. The day following her arrival she was stricken with appendicitis and she was operated upon at a local hospital. Yesterday her child died of cholera infantum after a brief illness. The bereaved mother left at noon today with the body of her baby for New Bedford, where the funeral and interment will occur.

Charlottesville Man to Address Veterans

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., July 25.—Dr. Henry W. Battle, of this city, whose father was a general in the Confederate army, has been selected as one of the orators at the big Confederate reunion, to be held Saturday of this week at Pamunkey, Fluvanna County. Dr. Battle will address the Fluvanna Chapter, Sons of Veterans.

Floyd W. King will address the "Vets" at 11:30, in the courthouse, after which the daughters of the Confederacy will be addressed by one of their members from Richmond. Then the four units—veterans, Sons of Veterans, World War veterans and Daughters of the Confederacy—will assemble for the parade to the Confederate monument. A big picnic dinner will follow the parade, and in the afternoon Dr. Battle will address the Sons of Veterans, and a speaker, yet to be chosen, will address the World War veterans.

N. C. CHILDREN TREATED IN TEMPORARY HOSPITAL

State Board of Health Oper-
ates Clinic at Yan-
ceyville.

DANVILLE, Va., July 25.—The public school at Yanceyville, N. C., will be converted into a temporary hospital on August 1, when the North Carolina Health Department starts its clinic for the removal of adenoids and tonsils from children in need of such treatment. Miss Reamy Williams, who has made a survey of Caswell County, reports that 500 children are in need of the operation. About fifty applications have been received from parents and more are expected. The operation is free to those who are unable to pay the expenses. Those who can are assessed a small fee.

"Trucks will arrive in Yanceyville this week with the hospital equipment. One of the rooms will be fitted out as an operating theater, and the electric generating machinery will be brought in portable form, giving electric lights in the building. There will be twelve graduate nurses on hand during the four days of the operation. Dr. J. B. Wright, of Raleigh, throat specialist, will operate. Dr. Williams, physician for the State Board of Health, will assist. Children who undergo the operation will remain in the hospital for a night. A similar clinic was held at this town, N. C., recently, 100 children being operated upon successfully.

COUNTY NOTES APPEAL TO ANNEXATION ORDER

NORFOLK, Va., July 25.—Norfolk County has sixty days in which to file a bill of exceptions against the annexation order entered by Judge Henry B. Holt, of Staunton, in the Circuit Court of Norfolk County yesterday afternoon. The county also has the right of appeal to the Virginia Supreme Court of Appeals, but it is generally believed that it will not exercise this right.

The order, which becomes effective January 1, has entered at 5 o'clock ending court proceedings that cost \$6,500, and lasted more than a month. Commonwealth Attorney A. C. Carnes, for Norfolk County, immediately moved exception to the order and was given sixty days in which to file his petition.

Teacher Goes to Birmingham.
LYNCHBURG, Va., July 25.—A. C. Kehr, eight years physical director of the local Y. M. C. A., and one of the most popular men ever with the association here, has resigned to become industrial physical director at the Birmingham (N. Y.) Y. M. C. A. He leaves here September 7. A. C. Carnes, of Petersburg, has been secured to fill the vacancy and he comes here September 1.

Speaker Points Out Success in
Getting Leviathan Re-

NORFOLK, Va., July 25.—Three hundred persons last night attended a Swanson-Bank-Sheriff meeting at Winona. Alfred C. Smith spoke for Senator Swanson, calling attention to his important committee assignment and to his success in obtaining concessions for Hampton Roads. The Leviathan repair job was especially mentioned. Mrs. Cooper and Walter Bank spoke for J. D. Hank, candidate for Congress, stressing the Towner-Sterling educational bill.

H. C. Sherrett made the most vigorous speech of his campaign for reelection to the Norfolk County road commission. He defended himself and the commission against recent attacks and again outlined the construction program the commission has in mind. Maurice G. Long declared that members of the commission are men of the highest order and that he is prepared to certify that he has never misappropriated a cent of the funds entrusted to their care. Arrangements have been made for a meeting in the interests of Representative J. T. Deal at Virginia Beach Wednesday night. Mr. Deal will be the principal speaker. He is calling attention to the fact that he is one of the most important provisions of the tariff bill, the bonus and army and navy measures, while his opponent has pledged his support only to the educational and filled bill.

COAST-TO-COAST TRADE BEGUN FROM NORFOLK

Purchase of New Ships Is Ex-
pected to Help
Port.

NORFOLK, Va., July 25.—Norfolk will gain in coast-to-coast service through the purchase by Robert Dollar of four Shipping Board vessels, the first of which is scheduled to load here for San Pedro and San Francisco between August 17 and August 19.

Heretofore the dollar ships which have been handled locally by E. E. Pallen and Co. have loaded cargo here for the Far East, have flown the British flag and were ineligible for intercoastal trade.

With the purchase from the Shipping Board of four Chinese-built vessels, which have been renamed the Melville Dollar, Diana Dollar, Margaret Dollar and Stuart Dollar, San Pedro and San Francisco have been added to the list of ports served.

While schedules for the operation of the dollar fleet are now not definitely fixed, it seems certain that the coast-to-coast vessels will call here at least once a month. They will load at the army base. The dollar vessels which fly the British flag, and which are in the "round-the-world" service, will continue to call here as at present.
