PETERSBURG'S DRUNKS DURING YEAR INCREASE

Police Report Shows 529 Were Arrested for Being Intoxicated.

[By Associated Press.] PETERSBURG, VA., Dec. 30.—Official figures from the police department today show that Petersburg in the year just past had 529 arrests for drunkenness, or more than any other city for the same cause. It was also revealed that in the last twelve years, 1911-22, inclusive, there were 39,439 arrests here for all causes, or 6,000 more than the total population of Petersburg. Of this number 12,118 were for drunkenness. The highest previous number was in 1915 when 6,542 arrests were made. In this year there were 3,235 arrests for drunkenness and in 1916, 2,428 arrests for the same cause.

Major John O. Walker, director of public safety, attributes the great number of arrests for drunkenness last year to the lack of leniency which police now show to those under the influence of liquor, caused by the good chance that the prisoner has of standing wisely on the prospector's person, which, under the state law, nets him \$10.

In the past years police had a habit of taking citizens home when they were drunk and only those hopelessly intoxicated were haled to court. But for this fact the total would have been astounding.

MORE DRUNKENNESS IN 1922 THAN IN 1921

Richmond Police Make Greatly Increased Number of Arrests for Intoxication.

Arrests here for drunkenness in 1922 showed an increase as compared with the number of persons taken into custody in 1921 for intoxication. The figures for 1921 are not yet available, but the records show that up to the first of this month there were 2,362 arrests for drunkenness in 1922, while in 1921 only 1,953 persons were arrested for indulging in inebriety.
