

ROSE DEFIES THE LAW

Services of Lawyer to Defend Him.

COURT NAMES ATTORNEYS

Says Plea of Insanity Is "All Nonsense."

Named Like a Stoic to the Charge of Murder in First Degree—Hearing Monday at 10 O'Clock.

Frank Rose, the self-confessed wife beater, defendant as ever and apparently as utterly unconcerned in regard to the fate which awaits him for committing one of the most dastardly crimes in the history of all crime, was yesterday arraigned in the criminal division of the District court on the charge of murder in the first degree. He was given the statutory time allowed. This places the time of his arraignment at 10 o'clock next Monday morning.

TAKES TIME TO MAKE PLANS.

Thomas R. Fuller Given Till Monday to Make Plan.

Thomas R. Fuller, the Ft. Douglas man charged with criminal assault on Miss Edith Gill, when arraigned yesterday in the criminal division of the Third District court, took the statutory time to enter his plea to the charge against him. The time set for the formality was next Monday at 10 o'clock.

PITCHER CASE SETTLED.

That Promised a Sensation Disposed of Out of Court.

The famous action brought in the District court here by Charlotte J. Pitcher against her husband, Frederick W. Pitcher, said to be a New York millionaire, was dismissed upon stipulation by Judge Hall yesterday. Mrs. Pitcher's complaint for separate maintenance alleged that her husband had deserted her on October 27, 1902, and that she had been in the sum of \$300 per month. Amended complaints, answers and cross-complaints and replies and answers were filed in the case never came to trial. The husband's answer, with the aid of his attorneys, had fixed matters up out of court, hence the filing of the stipulation.

BERGER GETS NINETY DAYS.

Sentenced to Jail for Burglarizing the Elgin Grocery.

Edward L. Berger, who on Christmas night was discovered in the act of burglarizing the Elgin grocery on East and South streets, yesterday pleaded guilty to petty larceny before Judge Hall of the District court and was sentenced to serve 90 days in the county jail. He is only 17 years old and was mainly on account of his youth charged with a more serious charge than larceny. BROWNS NOW AT PEACE.

Case of Mrs. Brown Against Her Husband Dismissed.

What is virtually a final disposition of the suit of Isabel Cameron Brown against Former Senator Arthur Brown was made when Judge Hall in setting his law and motion calendar dismissed the action. The suit was brought for separate maintenance by Mrs. Brown last fall when the Senator was particularly attentive upon Mrs. Brown. The suit created more excitement at the time and the answer filed by the Senator was of the extreme sensational nature. The suit has been continued from time to time and now the parties have patched up their differences the court dismissed the case on its own motion. It is understood that the case, however, can be reinstated should either of the parties so desire.

Suit Against the City.

F. E. Flattery brought suit in the District court yesterday against Salt Lake City to recover \$200, alleged to have been paid into the city treasury in order to have the Council take action upon an application of the plaintiff for a street railway franchise. The complaint alleges that the ordinance requiring the deposit of the above amount is "wholly illegal, unauthorized, void and of no force and effect whatsoever, for the reason that the Council and Mayor did not have, or have not now, authority to enact such an ordinance, requiring the payment of money as a condition precedent to the performance of their official duty. Judgment is asked for the \$200 and interest at 8 per cent per annum from February 11, 1902.

Suit to Recover Cash.

The State Bank of Utah brought suit in the District court yesterday against E. M. Weller and W. S. and W. C. Burton to recover judgment in the sum of \$245.20. The complaint sets forth that on February 11, 1896, judgment was rendered in the District court in favor of the plaintiff and against the above-mentioned defendants and O. H. Harbo, for \$249.34 and costs at \$44.33. The judgment debtor Harbo has died since the rendering of the judgment.

Court Notes.

An action to quiet title to lots 4, 5 and 6 in Scott's subdivision, block 62, in Kinney & Gourlay's improved plat of Salt Lake City, was filed in the District court yesterday by Stanley B. Milner against the unknown heirs of H. M. Scott.

David L. Gallacher filed a petition in bankruptcy in Federal court yesterday. His liabilities were placed at \$272,554, while his assets were given at \$100. Gallacher has been engaged in the manufacture of trunks on Third South street near State.

Suit has been filed in the City court against the Lace House company by Joseph E. Flaherty, who asks for judgment in the sum of \$434.50 for goods, wares and merchandise alleged to have been delivered by the plaintiff to the defendant during the month of last September.

AFTER A HORSE THIEF.

Deputy Sheriff T. J. Evans of Oneida County, Idaho, Applies to Gov. Wells for Requisition.

Deputy Sheriff T. J. Evans of Oneida county, Idaho, was in the city yesterday to secure from Gov. Wells requisition papers for the return to Idaho of Oliver Williams of Brigham City, who is charged with horse-stealing. Williams is alleged to have stolen three horses from a ranchman named Thomas Perry, near Maud, in October last, having escaped to this State immediately after the crime was committed. He was arrested at Brigham City on December 17th, and has been in custody since that time, but declined to be taken to Idaho without a requisition. The stolen horses have not been recovered, but it is claimed Williams was identified by several witnesses as the man who ran them away.

IN OTHER LANDS.

A riotous strike of 4000 coolies for higher wages occurred on the American railway at Sainam, China. No one was injured.

Madame Antoinette Sterling, the ballad singer and a vice-president of the Women's Christian Temperance union, is seriously ill in London.

Documents have been found tending to prove that Joan of Arc was the daughter of an Italian who was descended from the Secretary of State Hay to represent Panama in all consular matters, and that the Secretary had notified the other Consuls in Europe to take like action.

The bye-election in the Ashburton or Middle division of Devonshire, to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons caused by the death of Hon. C. R. Seale-Mayne (Liberal), resulted in the return of the Liberal candidate, H. T. Eve, by a majority of 176.

An imperial rescript to the Governor-General of Finland directs the Governor to dismiss all Finns employed in the state or municipal government who have not fulfilled their military service in the Finnish rifle battalion during 1902, and not to issue foreign passports to them for five years.

The First Chamber of the Netherlands Parliament, following the example of the Second Chamber, today voted about \$1,250,000 for the purchase of quick-firing Krupp guns, after a declaration of the War Minister that he considered the Krupp guns preferable to the Ehrhardt guns.
