

**NO KETCHUPS SOLD**  
Retail Dealers in Bogus Stuff to Be Prosecuted.

**COMPLAINTS ISSUED TODAY**  
Result of a Careful Investigation by Officials.

**Eleven Brands of Catsups Analyzed and Found to Contain Harmful Coloring Matter.**

Complaints will be sworn today against proprietors of several stores in this city charging them with violation of the food laws. The violations consist in selling and offering for sale of adulterated conditions—ketchups and catsups. There are eleven brands of ketchups and catsups being sold in the markets of this city, and not a single brand is free from adulteration. State Food Inspector Mortimer Heiler has had bottles of each made and analyzed and made by the State chemist. He has become tired of the continued violations of the laws, and intends to wage a lively war on the retailers of this city who persist in selling these adulterated products to the public.

The results of the analyses made by the State chemist, which were submitted to Mr. Heiler yesterday afternoon, showed that every brand contained either acid, some artificial sweetener, iodine, aniline dye, or all of them. The acid used as a preservative, while the dye used to cover up the inferior quality of the tomatoes used and to deceive the retailer. Ten of the eleven samples analyzed were colored with aniline dye of various shades. These dyes are manufactured by secret processes and are the most dangerous of poisons. They are all and little doubt exists as to their deleterious effect on the human system. Chemical dyes or vegetable dyes are not strong enough to answer the purpose, and that reason the mineral dye is employed.

Accompanying the report of the chemist are pieces of wool that had been dyed in the coloring matter extracted from the samples tested. The report stated that the dyes, or about two tablespoonfuls, the conditions had been used in each. From this small quantity a sufficient amount of dye was found in each sample. Two large pieces of wool. One grain piece was first colored and the dye was left to dry. The second piece of wool of the same color was then dyed in the coloring matter. Of the eleven brands tested, that known as the Blue Label ketchup was the only one found to not contain artificial coloring matter.

County Attorney Westcott will draw the complaints against the dealers of these brands. He will have them sworn and the cases will be brought to trial soon as possible. The idea is to prosecute those handling the adulterated goods and let them come back at the manufacturers. The names of the different brands are: Snyder's Home-made Catsup, manufactured by T. A. Snyder, Preservative company, Cincinnati; bought of W. S. Dixon, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; deep bluish-black color.

No. 2. "Pioneer Tomato Catsup," by Anderson company, Kansas City, Mo., bought of J. Campbell, Des Moines, Iowa, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; deep bluish-black color.

No. 3. "Heinz Tomato Ketchup," by H. Heinz company, Pittsburgh, Pa., bought of H. H. Brown, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; brownish color.

No. 4. "Pioneer Tomato Catsup," manufacturer not given; bought of H. Block, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; deep bluish-black color.

No. 5. "Bishop's California Tomato Catsup," by Bishop & Co., Los Angeles, Cal., bought of Great American Importing company, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; bluish color.

No. 6. "Home-made Catsup," by the C. C. C. Pickle company, Denver, bought of J. E. Kelly, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; deep bluish color.

No. 7. "Columbia Catsup," by the Melrose-Blackledge company, Indianapolis, Ind., bought of C. Cutting, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; light bluish color.

No. 8. "Blue Label Tomato Ketchup," by Currier Bros., Rochester, N. Y., bought of M. J. Wolf, January 12th. Analysis: Preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; deep brownish color.

No. 9. "Kayaville Catsup," by Kayaville Canning company, Kayaville, Utah, bought of People's Co-op, January 12th. Analysis: Coal-tar dye present; preservative, benzoic acid, addition of iodine; deep bluish color. Quite fluid; flat taste; deep color.

**WHAT VIOLATION COSTS.**  
All of the above brands, with the exception of the "Blue Label Ketchup" and "Snyder's Catsup," are said to contain aniline dye, indicating the use of vegetable coloring matter. This is the second time Commissioner Heiler has had analyses made of the various brands of catsups, and the dealers have had ample warning to quit handling the inferior brands. The penalty for violation of the food laws is a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

**TURNING THE TABLES**  
Pupils Tell What They Know About Teaching.

**SALT LAKE GETS IN LINE**  
Local High School as Painted by Pupils.

Criticisms on Many Phases of School Work Sent to the Clark University.

Principal George A. Eaton of the Salt Lake High school is in receipt of a letter from Prof. Brook, representing the Clark university, Worcester, Mass., requesting that he have each member of the senior class of his high school write a composition embracing the following points:

- 1—What a high school ought to do for me, and what is a high school for?
- 2—In what way has the high school helped me most?
- 3—Describe some sympathetic teacher you have had or the reverse (do not mention name, only give sex.)
- 4—Some points in which I have not been understood.
- 5—Why going to high school pays, or the reverse.
- 6—Why so many boys and girls drop out of the high school?
- 7—Useless studies in the high school.
- 8—Most popular study in the high school, and why?
- 9—What my parents think of the high school.
- 10—Some improvement in the high school which I would suggest.

In compliance with the request Principal Eaton presented the questions to the seniors, who, after thinking the matter over in a most serious manner, handed in their philosophical treatise yesterday morning.

Jonas G. Clark, a rich philanthropist, founded the school about seven years ago and left it one of the most richly endowed universities in the United States. It is a school for pedagogy and absolutely nothing else. Only post-graduate work is done and all work is carried on from the individual point of view—that is, studying the needs of each child and its individuality. It is in pursuance of this policy that the above-mentioned questions have been sent out. Heretofore views have generally, if not always, been obtained from the teacher's point of view, and this is somewhat of an important digression from the old policy.

This is the only school of its nature in the country. Harvard, Yale and Princeton formerly had departments which engaged in this work but these were all amalgamated and brought together when this school was formed. G. Stanley Hall, who has a national reputation as an educator of the highest rank, has been at the head of the school since its organization. Prof. Brook, formerly of the Princeton, is at the head of the investigating committee. He is an authority on pedagogy and is now one of the highest salaried teachers in the United States.
