

BURN PRISONERS ALIVE

Atrocities by Rebels in South West Africa.

GERMANY IS APALLED

Bodies of Enemy Dead, Mutilated With Axes.

Troops Are Being Hurried to the Scene of the Trouble With All Dispatch.

London, Jan. 26.—A dispatch to the Central News from Capetown says the bushmen, with the rebels in German Southwest Africa, are committing terrible atrocities. The limbs of the dead are chopped off and prisoners are said to have been burned alive.

Berlin, Jan. 26.—The news of the torturing to death of Germans in Southwest Africa received here today through British press dispatches caused the most painful impression among the public. The colonial office was without confirmation of the report, but the statements made are not discredited.

Director Stuebel of the colonial office asked the Reichstag budget committee today to defer consideration of the colonial appropriations as he was too busy sending off troops to South Africa to explain the estimates. A total of 2000 men are there, about 1000 preparing to embark. It is believed in the light of today's intelligence that this force is inadequate to adopt aggressive, crushing operations over a wide territory, dominated by 15,000 insurgent tribesmen.

The German transport officers are buying oxen in Cape Colony for the punitive expeditions. The veterans' societies are asking for contributions for those who are fighting in southwest Africa.

KISHINEFF MASSACRE.

Number of Those Charged With the Slaughter of Jews to Be Placed on Trial at Moscow.

Moscow, Jan. 26.—Another trial of prisoners connected with the Kishineff massacre is about to be resumed.

The prisoners indicted were divided into three categories. Only the first, comprising those charged directly with murder, have been tried. The number still awaiting a hearing is over 200. A formal appeal against the verdicts already delivered has been lodged with the Minister of Justice, but the Jews doubt if the appeal will be successful.

THREATEN MINISTERS

Warned to Leave Charges Under Penalty of Death.

New York, Jan. 26.—The Rev. John J. Cross, assistant rector of St. Peter's Episcopal church at Port Chester, and the Rev. Vincent Cigliano, who conducts an Italian mission connected with the First Presbyterian church there, have turned over to the Chief of Police two letters received by them in which their lives are threatened. The ministers are warned to leave Port Chester within fifteen days or they will be murdered. The missives evidently were the work of the same hand. Neither of the clergymen can assign any reason why their lives should be threatened. The police so far have been unable to procure any clue to the writer, but take the affair seriously because of the recent numerous cases of threatening letters in and about New York.

Smash-Up on Santa Fe.

Topeka, Kan., Jan. 26.—Passenger train No. 7, westbound, on the Santa Fe, crashed into the rear of a freight train at Wright's station, near Dodge City, this morning, derailing a dozen freight cars. Several passengers were seriously shaken up, but none fatally injured. The loss to the company is great, and traffic was delayed for several hours.

Filipino Outlaw Taken.

Manila, Jan. 26.—Gen. Vincente Lukban, formerly of Samar, and the instigator of the Balangui and other atrocities, has been arrested here. He is charged with conspiracy in company with Gomez Ricarte, whose conduct attracted considerable attention during the Smith-Waller campaign.

Mystery of the Hills in Oregon Town.

MAN AND WIFE FOUND DEAD

Woman Was Shot and Her Throat Cut.

A Letter Indicates That Woman Was Faithless, and Her Husband Had Killed Her and Himself.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 26.—The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Brown of Reinebeck, Ia., were found in the hills south of town this morning. Mrs. Brown had been shot in the breast, and the bullet falling to kill, her throat had been cut from ear to ear with a razor. Brown had shot himself in the head and, to make death certain, had swallowed poison. The couple came here some time ago from Iowa. On falling to arouse them this morning, Mr. and Mrs. E. I. Smith, with whom the couple had been stopping for two weeks, entered their room and found a note saying that both were tired of life and had agreed to die together. The note left directions as to where the bodies would be found, and, following the instructions, the Sheriff succeeded in locating the scene of the tragedy. The couple left a number of sealed letters addressed to various persons, one being addressed to Mrs. M. A. Brown of Reinebeck and another to Thomas Brown of Sumnerfield, Kan. Just previous to coming here the Browns lived in an Idaho town, where the husband was employed in a bank. During their residence here Brown taught school and his wife did various kinds of work for families. It is said the couple came west from Iowa with a wagon and team, arriving in this section about a year ago. Mrs. Brown had addressed a letter: "Dear Brother:—When this reaches you I will be no more. I have found another man in Oregon I love better than my husband." Her letter had been torn and thrown into a stove, but failed to burn and was picked up by the coroner and posted to her. It is believed now that Brown murdered his wife and then killed himself.

SMOKE AND ALTITUDE.

Butte, Mont., Jan. 26.—The concert scheduled for last night by Mme. Patti and her company did not come off as expected. Mme. It is supposed by many, however, that the sale of seats was not up to expectations.

ROBBERS USED TRUCK

Silks Valued at \$11,000 Stolen in New York.

New York, Jan. 26.—Belts of imported silks worth \$11,000 have been abstracted from an office building and lots at No. 10 West Eighteenth street. So large a quantity of goods was taken that the robbers must have used a truck. The robbery evidently occurred Sunday, but the different firms occupying the building were some time in discovering their loss. It is thought by the police that the burglars were admitted to the building by some person on the inside. At their leisure they then went through the place from top to bottom and escaped unnoticed.
