CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LECTURE
Judge Hanna Will Explain the Doctrine at the Salt Lake Theater This Evening.

Judge Septimus J. Hanna, one of the most eminent advocates of Christian Science in the country, will deliver a free address on the subject of his faith in the Salt Lake Theater at 8 o'clock this evening.

Judge Hanna is a member of the board of trustees of the church. He has been interested in Christian Science about seventeen years and began his work as lecturer a year ago. He was editor-in-chief of the Christian Science Journal and Sentinel for nine years, and at the same time was first reader in the other church at Boston. This work brought him in close touch with Mary Baker Eddy, the founder of Christian Science, and has thoroughly equipped him as a lecturer on the subject.

Judge Hanna was admitted to the bar in Chicago about twenty-five years ago, shortly afterward he went to Colorado and he has devoted his entire time to the cause which he believes helps men to better physical, moral and spiritual conditions. In speaking of this cause he recently said:

"Wrong ideas concerning the principles of Christian Science are in the minds of a great many, but I think I can say in truthfulness that the change of sentiment is in our favor. I am not boasting when I say that in every community where Christian Science has been established our adherents embrace many of the better class of thinkers—persons of prominence; but it is intended for all classes, of course. The purpose of these lectures is to give the public correct conception of the teachings of Christian Science and to correct errors that exist concerning this movement in the minds of the public."
