

THE REPUBLICAN SITUATION IN IDAHO.

The Fight on H. Smith Wooley--The Republican State Committee and the Coming Convention--Some of the Candidates Prominent.

(TRIBUNE SPECIAL.)

Nampa, Ida., Feb. 6.—In the election for the year of 1902 the Republicans of Idaho won a complete victory. They elected nearly every official from Constable to Governor.

When Weldon B. Heyburn was elected United States Senator from Idaho there were hardly enough Democrats in the Legislature to make the contest interesting.

While the Legislature was in session several bills were introduced in regard to the Clearwater river and the Clearwater river and the Clearwater river. There were two conflicting propositions, one known as the Weaver proposition, and the other as the Schaffel proposition. The bills for both propositions were defeated, owing to the demand for "an open river to the sea" cry that was raised in northern Idaho.

An application for a booming franchise on the Clearwater river was filed after the legislative session adjourned, by Francis E. Jenkins, G. C. Pickett and H. Smith Wooley. As soon as this application was filed the attack was made on the nomination of H. Smith Wooley for United States assessor at Boise, Ida. Most of the animus seemed to originate in Lewiston, Ida.

There is no great salary attached to the office and it is of no political significance, as all its minor officials are selected by civil service rules.

The opposition to the appointment of Wooley did not arise from the fact that he was a Mormon, but was fostered solely by rival timber syndicates, who wished to even themselves up by slaughtering Wooley's appointment as assessor.

The application of Jenkins, Pickett and Wooley for a franchise was rejected by the State Land Board. To these causes may be attributed all the troubles that have beset H. Smith Wooley.

The meeting of the Republican State committee at Boise, Ida., a few days ago

was simply a meeting to determine the time of holding the two state conventions. The committee passed a few complimentary resolutions indorsing the administration of Roosevelt.

Because resolutions were not passed in the present State administration, the Democratic politicians and Democratic papers tried to make a lot of cheap political capital out of the situation. They claimed that it was personal thrust at Gov. John T. Morrison and predicted the downfall of the Republican party in Idaho this year.

The Republican State central committee really had no right to pass any resolutions whatever. The coming State convention to nominate delegates to the national Republican convention, have the right if they wish, to entirely ignore the resolutions of the State central committee. Resolutions commending State and national administrations are always incorporated in the State convention platforms of all political parties.

The Republican State convention to be held in Moscow will undoubtedly commend the administration of Gov. John T. Morrison, whether it gives the nomination to him or some other able Republican.

When prospects for victory are bright there are always a large number of available candidates for the higher offices. The present year must be certainly forecast with bright promises of Republican victory in the future in Idaho.

The Hon. J. Frank Hunt of Pocatello has many friends who would like to see him become Governor. In Canyon county there are three candidates, Edward H. Dewey of Nampa, a very prominent business man; John T. Morrison of Caldwell, the present Governor, and A. B. Moss, the popular merchant of Payette.

In northern Idaho there are two prominent candidates for Governor, George Fletcher of Lewiston, a former resident of Boise, and Francis E. Jenkins of Moscow. Either of these candidates has great strength and a large personal following.

Which one of these gentlemen will lead the Republican host this fall we do not know, but victory will perch on the shoulders of the Republican party, regardless of party leaders.

She went out unconcernedly and a few minutes later was arrested by the police, who found Kohn bleeding to death.

NOT GUILTY IS VERDICT.

ST. LOUIS MILLIONAIRE ACCUSED OF BRIBERY ACQUITTED BY JURY.

Fulton, Mo., Feb. 6.—The jury in the case of Col. Ed Butler, the millionaire St. Louis politician, on trial on a charge of bribing nineteen members of the House of Delegates of St. Louis today returned a verdict of not guilty.

When the verdict was read a dozen of Col. Butler's friends gave forth a wild shout and dashed out into the street to spread the news. Butler stepped quickly forward and shook hands with Foreman Rosser. Then he walked down the line of jurors, shaking hands with each. Within a few minutes Judge Graves polled the jury and discharged them.

Friends surrounded Col. Butler and he held an informal levee, laughing and joking with those about him.

Circuit Attorney Folk of St. Louis, who was in the courtroom, appeared dejected.

"I thought the State had a good case," he said. "Beyond that I have nothing to say at this time."

About eighteen ballots were taken, according to Foreman Rosser, and at the start the jury stood ten for acquittal and two for conviction.

"One of these voting to convict changed after the first ballot," said Mr. Rosser. The other man held out stubbornly until 9:45 o'clock this morning, when he finally came into line.

"The jurors did not want to convict the defendant on the testimony of hoodlums and perjurers, whose statements were flatly contradicted by men of good character."

"Again, we did not think the circumstances pointed to the defendant's guilt. On the evidence of the State, even though we thoroughly credited it, there was serious doubt as to Butler's guilt. Watching the facts carefully, we think we did our full duty fairly and impartially."

ANOTHER BIG CARRIER FOR PACIFIC TRADE

Groton, Conn., Feb. 6.—The steamer Dakota, built for the Great Northern Steamship company was successfully launched today from the yards of the Eastern Ship-Building company.

Amid a dim of salutes from whistles of vessels, factories and locomotives, and cheers of fully 5000 spectators, Miss Mary Fleming of Ellendale, N. D., was sponsor, and as the great craft began to slip away from the christening stand she broke a bottle of champagne on the prow, saying "I christen thee Dakota."

The Dakota, like her sister ship, the Minnesota, which was launched at the Eastern Ship-Building company's yard in April, 1903, is of the largest type of cargo and passenger vessels built in the United States. The dimensions are 630 feet over all, 73 feet 6 inches breadth, 36 feet molded depth, 33 feet draught and gross tonnage 22,000. Triple expansion engines of 11,000 horse-power driving twin screws are expected to develop an average speed of fourteen knots an hour.
