MINERAL PRODUCT FOR MARCH.

In spite of the storms of the month and the consequent bad roads, which materially reduced the marketings of ore from a number of the mines, notably the Daly West, the March output was high, a material gain over the product of March last year.

The gain of the independent smelters is one of the brilliant features of the mining situation here. Those smelters are owned in connection with great mines, and they are constantly being added to in capacity, so that they represent a healthy growth; a more productive capacity from the mines as these are being more extensively opened and the ore bodies developed.

The dividends of the month foot up a total of \$333,500. Of this amount the Daly West paid its usual monthly \$117,000; the Silver King its regular monthly \$100,000; the Gemini, \$50,000; the Grand Central, \$27,000; the Horn Silver, \$20,000; the Annie Laurie, \$12,500; the Sacramento, \$5,000; the Century, \$3,000; and the Utah, \$1,000.

The dealings on the Stock Exchange during the month were at the minimum. The total number of shares sold during the month was 468,119, compared with 1,032,022 shares during the corresponding month last year; the money value of the transactions being \$202,956.50, compared with \$868,913.37 during the month of March, 1903.

A strong reinforcement to the stream of wealth flowing from the independent smelting operations came on the market yesterday in the forwarding of copper, gold and silver-bearing concentrates from the Utah Copper company's \$300,000 copper plant at Bingham.

The product of the independents for March in copper bullion containing gold and silver was 1,208,400 pounds from the Utah Con., 1,023,400 pounds from the United States, and 727,190 pounds from the Bingham Con.
