SOCIALS NOMINATE TICKET IN ILLINOIS

PEORIA, Ill., April 17.—The State convention of the Socialist party was held in this city today, with the largest attendance in the history of the party, 39 delegates being present, half of whom were from Cook county. A full State ticket was chosen following the National convention, which was carried out by a hot fight by the close vote of 69 to 28. The State ticket included Governor, John Collins, Chicago; Lieutenant-Governor, A. R. Brower, Elgin; Treasurer, A. S. Tibbets, Rockford; Secretary of State, A. S. Howell, Rockford; Attorney-General, Sam Black, Peoria; State Auditor, Albert T. Brennan, Chicago; School Trustees, Mrs. Gertrude Brewster Hunt, Maywood, Maize, and W. T. Dent, Chicago.

ANGLO-FRENCH TREATY IS NOT SATISFACTORY

ST. JOHN, N. F., April 17.—The text of the Anglo-French colonial treaty has not yet been published here. The second clause of the French shore arrangement obliges French and British fishermen to terminate their operations by October 20th this year. This clause would prevent New Foundland fishermen from fishing during the month of the year, and would deprive their prosecution of the winter herring fishery at Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay to which the United States and Canadian vessels resort for herring cargoes. The New Foundland Government will guarantee the ratification of the treaty unless this defect be remedied.

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WOMAN KILLED HER HUSBAND AND THEN HERSELF

Woman's Suicide in Rooming-House Followed Quickly on the Heels of Murder.

OGDEN, Utah, April 17.—A double tragedy which was at first believed to be the suicide of a man and his wife, in a Twenty-second street lodging-house, is now regarded as a graver crime. The landlady heard groans, and breaking a door, found Clarence J. Stone cold in death and his wife writhing in the agony of morphine poisoning. Mrs. Stone had died everything possible for the woman, but she died in a short time. The bodies were removed to Larkin's undertaking parlors.

Excessive cigarette smoking, the county coroner physician said, had induced consumption, which caused Haley's death.
