

Colorado Strike Is Discussed

Western Federation of Miners Takes Up and Considers Labor Trouble in the State.

DENVER, June 2.—The convention of the Western Federation of Miners spent the entire morning in a discussion of the mining situation in this state, particularly in the Cripple Creek and Telluride districts. A committee consisting of R. E. Allen of Wyoming, Malcolm Gillie of Montana and H. B. Seaman of British Columbia was appointed to visit the Cripple Creek district and report to the convention the situation as they find it there. A like committee will probably be appointed to visit Telluride. The report submitted yesterday by the committee on affiliation with the American Federation of Labor was read at the afternoon session. The delegates voted to defer all debate on the matter until tomorrow, when an entire day will be devoted to its consideration. The committee has not affirmed the advisability of affiliating either with the American Federation of Labor or with the United Mine Workers of America. While the advantages arising from such an alliance are enumerated, an amalgamation of all labor forces in the United States is advocated, and it is the sentiment of the committee that a movement toward this end should be aimed at by the Western Federation of Miners. It was accordingly recommended that committees representing the labor organizations in every state be appointed to a joint conference to the end that some plan may be mapped out for the union of all labor organizations of the country. The abolition of union transfer cards is threatened in a movement which has been started in the convention, and final action is expected to be taken tomorrow. The following resolution was adopted covering strikes: "Resolved, That we, the delegates of the twelfth annual convention of the Western Federation of Miners, individually and collectively, hereby approve of the stand taken by our brothers in Cripple Creek, San Juan and other districts in Colorado, and pledge to them the moral and financial support of the Western Federation of Miners."

To Raise Dates on Sandy Waste

Professor of Agriculture Establishes Experiment Station on the Colorado Desert.

UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, June 2.—Prof. A. V. Stubenrauch of the Department of Agriculture of the University of California, has just returned to Berkeley after spending three weeks at Mecca, on the Colorado desert, where the university, in conjunction with the United States bureau of plant industry, is establishing an experimental station for the purpose of raising dates, figs and grapes. The station was in receipt of 200 date plants from the Sahara desert which Prof. Stubenrauch had charge of planting. The department has 15 acres under cultivation, half of which has been successfully planted to dates. Prof. Stubenrauch is of the opinion that all the dates consumed in the United States can be grown on the desert provided the needed amount of artesian water can be provided.

Stole Thirty Cents, Gets Nine Years

Former Convicts Are Given Long Term in Prison for Theft of Small Sum.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Recorder Goff has sentenced John Crane and Arthur Nagle to nine years and six months in prison for stealing 30 cents. The men are former convicts, it is said, and were found guilty of holding up a woman in Thirty-third street. The fact that her purse, which they snatched, was almost empty did not lessen their crime in the eyes of the court.

Banished From St. Petersburg.
ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.—Foreign Minister Lamdorff refuses to make a complaint against Prince Dolgorouky, who committed a personal assault on the Minister Monday evening. He is still under arrest. If the medical authorities decide that his mental derangement is not sufficient to warrant his incarceration in the asylum he probably will be forbidden to live in St. Petersburg.

Was Mrs. Williams Murdered?
OMAHA, June 2.—Norman Williams, sentenced to be hanged at The Dalles, Or., for the murder of an Omaha woman, formerly was employed by an express company in Omaha. His wife died in Omaha under mysterious circumstances. The woman carried \$200 life insurance, which Williams collected.

Wireless Telegraph Tests With Steamer
Hospital Ship Solace Keeps in Communication With Land 250 Miles Away.
HONOLULU, June 2.—The United States hospital ship Solace, leaving here yesterday afternoon for Guam Island, made wireless telegraph tests and kept in connection with the apparatus of the cruiser New York seventy miles. Later, she maintained communication with the Inter-Island Wireless Telegraph company for 104 miles. At noon today, at a distance of 250 miles, the test signal letter V was five times repeated. When leaving San Francisco the Solace last communication with the shore at seventy-eight miles.

Shot Dead While Trying to Escape
Prisoner at United States Barracks at Columbus, Ohio, Killed by a Sentry.
COLUMBUS, O., June 2.—John W. Manning, a prisoner at the United States barracks, was shot and instantly killed today by Private Speck, one of the sentries at the garrison. Manning was held awaiting trial for desertion. While at work today he attempted to escape. Falling to stop at the command he was shot through the head, dying instantly.

Church Pew Is Not Exempt
Unexpected Echo of Sully Failure Is Heard in Court Proceedings.
NEW YORK, June 2.—An unexpected echo has been heard of the Sully failure. It arose over a pew in St. Bartholomew's church which was bought by Mr. Sully some time before the collapse of his firm. The deed for the pew reached his office after the receivers took charge and fell into the hands of these officials. Finally Mr. Sully made inquiry and demanded the document, which he said was exempt, until advice could be secured as to whether the pew was an asset of the cotton merchant. Upon the advice of their counsel the deed has been held pending the appointment of a trustee in bankruptcy.

Don't Believe in Vacations

Russell Sage of the Opinion That Two Weeks' Rest Each Year Is a Delusion.

NEW YORK, June 2.—In an article under the caption "The Injustice of Vacations," the Independent quotes Russell Sage to the effect that he never has taken a vacation in his life; that the "vacation habit is the outgrowth of abnormal or distorted business methods, and that a man is less fitted to do good work for his employer after two weeks' rest each year than he was before. "When I was a boy," said the veteran financier, "the practice was not in vogue. During the eighty-three years of my career I have not once taken a vacation. As a matter of fact, I was so glad to get a chance to learn business that the idea of asking my employer to make me a present of two weeks of the time that belonged to him would have been preposterous. Besides, I was eager to advance in business. "Is it not absurd to suppose that a man can in two weeks recuperate from the wear and tear of a year's work? On the contrary, I have too often observed that men will, while on their vacations, make inroads upon their vitality and pursue that cannot be repaired in the following eleven months and two weeks."

Nevada Gets No Money for Militia

Has Not Military Organization Required by Law to Receive Aid From Uncle Sam.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Judge Advocate-General Davis has rendered an opinion that Nevada is not entitled to a pro rata share of the appropriation made for the National Guard, because the state has not maintained the military organization required by law. One hundred men for each Senator and Representative is necessary to comply with the law. Under the decision \$7,000 will be covered into the treasury.

WANT SEARCH MADE FOR MISSING VESSEL

WASHINGTON, June 2.—The request of the New York Maritime exchange that a warship be sent in search of the Conemaugh, of the International Mercantile Marine company, now six weeks overdue on its trip from Honolulu to New York, has been received at the Navy department. The vessel nearest to the Chilean port where the Conemaugh was last sighted is the Boston, now enroute from the Isthmus for San Francisco, and about due at Acapulco. She is something like 200 miles distant. On the Atlantic side there are no United States warships in the Caribbean sea.

Coloradoan, Aged 71 Years, Weds an Iowa Woman, Aged 54 Years.

GLENWOOD SPRINGS, Colo., June 2.—After hunting each other for three days, E. Perham of Carbon-dale, this state, and Mrs. Sarah Sherwood of New Hartford, Ia., were married yesterday. Perham is 71 years old and a ranchman; his wife is 54 and came here from Iowa in response to a proposal accepted through a matrimonial agency. Neither knew the other, and while they agreed by letter to meet here several days ago, they missed each other, and it was not until three days later that they finally met and were married. Perham had considerable trouble in meeting up enough courage to ask for the marriage license.

Mathewson Is Promoted.
ANACONDA, Mont., June 2.—Manager E. P. Mathewson of the Washoe smelter has been notified of his appointment to be in charge of all the company's holdings in Anaconda and this vicinity. In addition to being in charge of the smelter, he will have charge of the great railway, the electric light and water company, the brick yards and the Montana hotel.

Short in His Accounts.
NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 2.—Douglas M. Smith, paying teller in the National Tradesmen's bank of this city, was arrested today, charged with being a defaulter. His shortage is \$70,000.

TWO NEW COMPANIES FOR UTAH COUNTY
Articles of incorporation of two new companies were filed yesterday with the Secretary of State. Both corporations are organized at Provo City, Utah county. The William M. Roylance company is formed to do a general wholesale commission business. Its capital stock is \$25,000, divided into 2500 shares of the par value of \$10 each. The officers of the company are: William M. Roylance, president; James A. Loveless, vice-president, and C. M. Humphrey, secretary and treasurer. The other corporation is The Spencer Seedless Apple company of Idaho. The pursuit of the company shall be to conduct a general nursery business. The capital stock is \$7000, divided into shares of the face value of 10 cents each. William M. Roylance is president of the company, George Haver-camp, vice-president, and Alex Hedquist, secretary and treasurer.




