

MOTHER CAUSED SON'S SUICIDE

Didn't Like Baltimore Mayor's Bride.

Refused to Become Reconciled to the Marriage, and Worry Did Rest.

Quarrel With a Warm Friend Also Had Something to Do With the Tragedy.

BALTIMORE, June 5.—Despondency over the continued hostility of his mother toward his bride, and also over a serious quarrel with his close friend, City Solicitor W. Cabell Bruce, is believed to have been the cause of the suicide of Mayor McLane of Baltimore. It is now believed that these troubles, in addition to worry over political opposition and the strain of the labor following the great fire in February, unbalanced Mr. McLane's mind and caused him to shoot himself.

Cardinal Gibbons, in making public expression of his views, of the Mayor's death, sums up by saying his suicide "is in the nature of a serious public calamity."

Gradually facts are coming out of the sorrow of Mr. McLane over the attitude of his mother toward his wife. The Mayor had courted Mrs. Van Eiber for ten years and their marriage had often been reported. From the first talk of affection between them Mrs. McLane manifested objection to her son's admiration for the prominent widow, and it is said that she was deeply affected by the news of their engagement to Washington three weeks ago.

Those who were closely associated with the Mayor in his office say that since his marriage he had been unable to concentrate on any detail of business. Frequently he sat at his desk for hours looking blankly before him, with his face deep in his hands. Almost all the members of his family were opposed to his marriage, but it was said that his only worry about the objections of his mother.

A day or two after his return from his wedding trip Mr. McLane quarreled with the City Solicitor over the expenditure of the loan obtained in connection with a new dock plan. The Mayor and Mr. Bruce had been close friends from boyhood, and both men were loath to differ. A personal dislike grew into a bitter feud, and it was reported in the inner circle of politics that they had parted in anger.

Mrs. McLane is still prostrated over her husband's death, and there is some fear for her recovery. She is in the care of two physicians. Several of her relatives are now with her and one of the callers at her bedside today was the aged father of the dead Mayor.
