UNIDENTIFIED MAN FOUND DEAD IN AN OLD CABIN

Special to The Tribune. PARK CITY, June 23.—An unidentified man was found dead in an old cabin in Thayne's canyon this morning. A force of men is at work on the road about half way up the canyon and about the time mentioned some of them went to the spring for a drink. Near the spring is a cabin, and while peeping into this John Kelly discovered a man lying upon his back with his feet crossed as if asleep. Upon examination it was found that the man was dead. Word was at once sent to town, and the Coroner immediately went up the canyon and made an investigation. No evidence could be obtained to show how the man had come by his death, neither could anything be found by which he could be identified. To all appearances he had gone into the cabin to rest. The only things found upon the body were a trunk key and a Masonic and an Odd Fellows' card. The body was brought down to Richardson's undertaking parlors this afternoon, where it will remain while further efforts are made to identify it. Deceased was a man of medium height and size, smooth shaven and apparently about 45 years of age.

Diplomats Stoned at Port Au Prince

Soldiers Forming the Palace Guards Attack French and German Envoys.

PARIS, June 23.—The Foreign Office has received a dispatch from M. Deprez, the French Minister at Port Au Prince, Haiti, saying that while he and the German Minister were driving past the palace yesterday they were attacked and stoned by soldiers forming the palace guard. M. Deprez was struck on the leg by a stone and was slightly injured. The Ministers' wives, who were in another carriage following, were also pelted. The wife of the French Minister is an American. As Foreign Minister Delcasse has only just received the dispatch he has not yet determined what steps shall be taken, but the officials consider it certain that France will make an energetic demand for redress. One French warship is near the scene and another is at the French naval headquarters in the West Indies. It is expected that Germany will make a similar demand for redress. The attack, it is said, was the outcome of the feeling among the population and the Government against foreigners, the natives desiring to hold them responsible for the wretched financial situation of Haiti. The proceedings against the French and German officials of the National bank charged with participation in the issue of \$200,000 in fraudulent securities early in 1903 had not been ended. Some of the officials are still in prison, and others have sought safety in flight. Persons prominently connected with the National bank have been protesting against the long detention in prison of the officials who are under charges. The most serious feature of the affair is that the attack was made not by an irresponsible mob, but the palace guard, which directly connects the Haitian Government with the occurrence.
