**MEN WILL NOT BE
FIRED BY FUEL CO.**

Auditor Evans Explains Representa-
tions to Officers of the Na-
tional Guard.

John F. Evans, auditor of the Utah
Fuel company, denies absolutely that
there was in the application that three
of his men be excused from National
Guard duty at the encampment an im-
putation that the men would lose their
positions in the event that they were
not excused.

"There was no intention on the part
of any one connected with the company
that the men would be discharged,"
said Mr. Evans yesterday. "On the
other hand their places would not only
be held for them, but their pay would
go on while they were absent. Then,
too, if there is blame to be attached to
any one on account of the applications
it would not be charged to the Utah
Fuel company—it was a matter with
which only the men and myself had
anything to do.

"The facts in the case are these: On
the 11th of the month three of our boys
who were recently promoted to ma-
jor informed me that they had been
ordered out for the encampment, and
realizing that the work here was new
to them, that they would be doing con-
tinuous work and that at this time
would be very busy getting out our
annual report, they asked me to join
with them in asking that they be ex-
cused from the encampment service. I
had been informed that they would be
excused from this service upon the
proper representations being made, and
as it would inconvenience us greatly to
be deprived of more than 25 per cent
of our office force for a quarter of a
month, I complied with their request.
I addressed letters to Capt. Webb
and Lieut. Caine, setting forth the cir-
cumstances and asking that the men
be excused, if possible. I later received
a communication from Capt. Webb say-
ing that the men had been ordered out.
I then wrote a letter to Gov. Wells on
the subject, to which I have received
no reply.

"It would have been a great accom-
modation to us if the men could have
been spared from the service at this
time, but if not we should simply make
the best of it. There was no thought
of their losing their positions on ac-
count of it. Perhaps one of the boys,
I am upon making his case stronger,
did say that if he had to go it might
result in his losing his job, but he was
not authorized to say it."

HAPPENINGS ABROAD

VILLEFRANCE, France, Aug. 18.—The

LONDON, Aug. 18.—Japan has officially
notified Great Britain that she does not

the harbor of Chefoo August 12.

undertaking to accord the same treatment

tions as is granted to the most favored
nation—subject to the usual departmental
formalities.

WHERE WAR RAGES

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 18.—This
morning for the first time, the news-
papers were allowed to print the fact that
the cruiser Rurik had been sunk. The
news was held back until the Government
had received official confirmation from
Vladivostok.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 18.—The report
that Gen. Rozhdestvensky, the Russian
commander at Port Arthur, declined to
surrender to the Japanese, was widely
circulated. The Japanese, however, stated
that the Japanese would have been amazed if he had
yielded.

BERLIN, Aug. 18.—The Foreign office
today issued a statement in connection with
the reports to Russia regarding the
neutral, expresses the view that Japan may
