## ARRESTED IN IDAHO FOR STEALING SHEEP IN UTAH.

Special to The Tribune. OGDEN, Sept. 13.—Joseph Walker, charged with stealing sheep, is under arrest at American Falls, Ida., and will be brought to Ogden tomorrow.

The chase began some weeks ago, when a number of sheep disappeared from T. H. Ballantyne's ranch, near Monte Christo. Walker was suspected and was arrested. During the chase he was seen at the track and the Sheriff notified, but as Mr. Ballantyne could not recognize him nothing was done.

The following day the same man was reported at the stock yards and Deputy Sheriff Belnap was sent down to interview him. Walker was found, but when the Monte Christo affair was mentioned he pulled a gun on the officer and said: "I know what you want me for. It isn't that sheep business. If it was I might go, but you want to send me back to Kansas and I'll die first. It's you or me for it right now, and you had better drive on. I'll never be taken alive."

Belnap drove off and Walker crossed the tracks, stole a bicycle belonging to a switchman and rode south. The switchman jumped on the bicycle and chased the man to Thirtieth street, where he left the wheel and entered a barn. As the roaders attempted to surround him, Walker and his accomplice drove them away and disappeared. Sunday he was seen at Prater's, which put the officers on the trail.

Belnap reached home tonight with two prisoners instead of one. Besides Walker he brought home Ralph Douglas, who was arrested at the request of the Sheriff of Salt Lake county for robbing a barber shop at Murray. Douglas was picked up at Pocatello.

**Assault With Deadly Weapon.** Special to The Tribune. JUNCTION, Sept. 13.—Fenton Reynolds of Marysville was held to answer to the highest court last Saturday by P. C. King, Justice of the Peace of Kingston, on the charge of committing an assault with a deadly weapon on August 19 at Marysville, by shooting at and wounding John H. Lee.

Reynolds had a hearing before J. F. Gibbs, Justice of the Peace of Marysville, about ten days ago, and was discharged, but the County Attorney didn't think the case was justified in discharge. The defendant under the evidence and filed a new complaint before Justice Stoker of this city on August 19 at Marysville, by shooting at and wounding John H. Lee.

Part of the posse, under Chief Constable Campbell of the provincial police, thought they found a trace of the bandits today near Fernside, south of Lynden, and Campbell wired tonight that he believed he had the robbers trapped.

A party of the man-hunters got news near Bellingham this afternoon that two men had been seen in the vicinity of the robbers, and carrying rifles, were seen going west, while the third man, the leader, was seen through the guard on the south toward Seattle.

Fearing that the men going west would make for Point Roberts, several officers have been sent there to prevent the escape of the men in fishing boats. The police are certain that the men have not gone farther in search of the robbers.

A telegram from Blaine tonight says that officers have been there searching cabins and logging camps, without finding a clue. The rewards offered by the Canadian Pacific railway, Dominion Express company and the British Columbia government for the capture of the robbers now aggregate \$7500.

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**POPULATION OF OREGON.**

Figures of State Labor Commissioner Show Large Increase Since 1900.

SALEM, Or., Sept. 13.—According to the figures of State Labor Commissioner O. P. Koff, the population of Oregon is at present 470,024, against 412,526 in 1900, an increase of 57,498. In making his computation the Commissioner found that the number of children of school age who are not attending school is increasing at an alarming rate. The Legislative Assembly in 1903 made a law compelling the attendance at school of children under the age of 14 years in order to correct this evil, but Commissioner Koff's statistics indicate that no apparent effort is being made to enforce the law.

### PARK MAN FINED \$5 FOR BEATING ANOTHER MAN
