Utah Lake Project Is Feasible.

Meeting of Experts in Salt Lake Was Finished Yesterday.

Mr. Savage Says the Reservoir Scheme Looks Even Better Than He Expected.

Supervising Engineer H. N. Savage of the U. S. Reclamation service, who has been in consultation with Consulting Engineers George Y. Wisner and W. H. Saunders, has completed the work before him this week and the board of members has scattered to continue their investigations.

Considerable data was placed before the board and Mr. Savage stated yesterday that the project of making Utah Lake a reservoir was rapidly assuming definite form. He said:

"The meeting that closed today was for the purpose of considering data gathered under the supervision of District Engineer George L. Swendsen in reference to the different irrigation projects in the State.

Better Than Expected.

"Primarily the Utah lake project was up for consideration. The outlook at present is even better than we expected. In company with the board I made a trip to the lake and went over the ground carefully, considering all the sources of water supply to the lake, taking measurements as to its volume and examining many minor details.

"We also went over the surveys, maps and data that have been gathered. There is much material to be moved and many difficulties to be overcome, but I believe that these may be overcome by exercising careful judgment. The question of maintaining a channel through the bottom of the lake in times of low water is a serious one, and will require careful engineering to overcome.

Water Rights Important.

"One of our principal things we are studying is the question of water rights. We will have to be extremely careful regarding the water rights of people along the tributaries of the lake and the lake itself. Of course these can not be imposed upon, and we have to know just what these rights are before we can go ahead with our work.

"This winter we may bring in some of the engineers from the surrounding projects and put them to work on this Utah lake data. There is much work still to be done and we will keep at it until the final report is ready for the officials at Washington.

BOSTON CAPITAL COMING.

Visitor Says Utah Offers Great Inducements to Investors.

W. L. Wright of the Security Trust company of Boston, Mass., was among the callers at the Real Estate association's bureau of information yesterday.

"I consider the future of Salt Lake City and Utah brighter than that of any part of California," declared Mr. Wright to Secretary Miller.

"I have about decided to make heavy investments here, as a careful examination of the present and future conditions that Salt Lake offers, together with inducements from any other city of the West. PAYING THEIR TAXES.

Two Thousand Receipts Have Been Issued by the County Treasurer.

The County Treasurer's office in the city and county building is beginning to show considerable activity, as some 2000 payments have already been made on the tax bills. This will largely increase during the month of October. It is sometimes very amusing to watch how faithfully some people pay their taxes, while others are slow to do so. Ordinarily people make provision to pay taxes during the month of October—but many of them will hold the money in their pockets until the last day and minute and undergo the discomfort of standing in line for several hours trying to reach the window to make the payments. Very often something will happen at the last minute to delay them, and they are very much disgruntled because a penalty is attached. The rolls will be closed promptly this year on November 15, and all unpaid taxes advertised after that date.

County Financial Report.

County Treasurer W. O. Carbis gives the receipts and disbursements of his office for the month of September as follows: Balance on hand September 1, \$12,199.76; receipts for September, \$17,802.54; total, \$29,002.30. Disbursements, \$12,979.50; balance, October 1, \$16,022.80. This is distributed as follows among the various departments: General expense, \$2,883.22; County school, \$277.69; State Witness and Juror fund, \$142.90; Redemption, \$692.35; bond interest, \$11.90.

Business Notes.

There is a strong probability that the board of governors of the Commercial club will meet tonight or Monday to take up the question of extending its support to E. Mahler in the suburban railway project. It has been impossible for the board to get a quorum on account of the absence of six members from the city and county because two of the board members were busy with work connected with the State fair.

The Hubbard Floral company has moved to the new building built by E. H. Holmes at 114-116 East Second South, and 2000 invitations have been sent out for the big opening. Floral souvenirs are to be given to the ladies.

A dispatch, the first sent over the wires of the Postal Telegraph company out of Salt Lake, was transmitted yesterday. It was to Clarence H. Mackey and was a message of congratulation from P. H. Lannan, Vice-President, W. H. Baker and General Superintendent E. J. Reilly, who have arrived from Chicago and are watching the equipment of the new office. The local office will accept business in about ten days.

Yesterday's local bank clearings amounted to \$44,797.77, as against \$42,673.24 of a year ago yesterday. Last September the clearing was \$42,926.66, as against \$12,568,222 for this September.

Trade of United States With Canada

Statement Prepared by Bureau of Statistics Shows an Enormous Total.

Special to The Tribune. WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 29.—The trade of the United States with Canada is shown from the standpoint of the United States in a series of tables included in the annual report of the chief of the bureau of statistics, just made public by the Department of Commerce and Labor, while tables also received by the bureau of statistics from the Canadian Government present a picture of that trade from the Canadian standpoint. Curiously, while the two statements relate to the same trade and are presented for fiscal years which terminate in each case on June 30, the figures of values differ materially.

What Statement Shows.

The statement of the United States exports to Canada for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904, shows a total of \$131,274,346, while the Canadian statement of imports from the United States, which should include only the articles classified as exports from the United States to Canada, shows a total value of such imports of \$143,070,578, or a total \$12,000,000 greater than the United States statement of export values of presumably the same articles. An examination of the Canadian and United States figures for other years also shows a marked difference of statement. In the fiscal year 1903 the Canadian figures of imports from the United States exceed by \$5,000,000 the figures of the United States showing exports to Canada, and this is true of the figures for the fiscal year 1902.

Growth of Commerce Rapid.

While the figures of the Canadian Government and those of the United States differ somewhat as to the value of the commerce passing between them, they sufficiently agree to show that the growth of that commerce has been very rapid. Exports from the United States to Canada have increased, according to the figures of the United States, from \$24,000,000 in 1854 to \$131,000,000 in 1904, a period of fifty years. Most of this growth, however, has occurred in the last decade. From 1854 to 1894, a period of forty years, the increase, as shown by the figures of the bureau of statistics, was but \$2,000,000, the figure for 1894 being \$5,000,000; while from 1894 to 1904, a ten-years' period, the increase was \$75,000,000. In the forty years prior to 1894 exports from the United States to Canada increased \$32,000,000; in the ten years subsequent to 1894 they increased \$75,000,000.

NEW YORK DOGS HAPPY.

Strike of Bologna Sausage-Makers Causes Them Great Joy.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30.—The bologna-makers' unions of Manhattan and Brooklyn have decided to strike at once if the employers do not reconsider their refusal to renew the wage agreement, which expires today. At present the men are paid \$14 a week for a ten-hour day. The employers are organized as the Bologna Manufacturers' association and have a joint executive board, which notified the bologna makers several weeks ago that the agreement would not be renewed.

LEARNING TO TALK.

Full Grown Man Who Is Being Taught Like a Child.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Sept. 30.—A full-grown man with all his physical and mental faculties in perfect order, but just learning to talk, is the singular position in which Harry J. Scott, a prominent young man of Goshen, finds himself.

SCHOOL GIRL LOSES LIFE.

Fifteen-Year-Old Miss Is Drowned in Lake Michigan.

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—A force of United States troops from Fort Sheridan, 200 students of Lake Forest college, and many residents of the suburb, several in automobiles, began early today to search the woods for Frances Parkhurst, a 15-year-old school girl, missing from Ferry hall. It was the culminating effort of a search conducted for hours last night through woods, ravines and along the lake shore. In automobiles, on foot and in carriages, the men of the town and college persevered in the hunt for the missing girl until almost midnight. This morning the body of the lost girl was finally found in Lake Michigan. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death, after listening to testimony of the girl's parents and of the school authorities.

Succeeds Funston at Vancouver.

PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 30.—Brig-Gen. Constant Williams arrived here today from San Francisco. Gen. Williams has been appointed successor of Gen. Frederick Funston as commander of the Department of the Columbia, with headquarters at Vancouver, Wash.


