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JEALOUS BOY KILLS NEW BABY

Wanted Little Sister "to Go Away." Though Not Quite Three, He Attacks Infant With Statuette.

Little Emmet Robinson's "Nose Was Out of Joint" When Wee Sister Gladys Arrived.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—When a new baby arrives the happy mother sometimes says to her other children, whom, like the new baby, she loves with all her heart: "You must be out of joint."

To use the homely, motherly expression, small Emmet Robinson's "nose was out of joint" a month ago when a little sister came to his home at Nyack. He was two years and seven months old, the first, the only child with whom Gladys, who he thought, childishly, had taken his place in the affections of his mother and father.

"Baby Gladys smiled in her mother's arms. Emmet felt that he was dethroned as baby-ruler of the household. His royal nose was out of joint; infant jealousy tore his heart. He called the father, who he thought, childishly, had taken his place in the affections of his mother and father.

"See your new sister, Emmet. Look how sweet she is, your helpless sister. You must be out of joint. It will be for you to protect her." But the boy tried to thrust them aside, tore himself from them, ran away, hid himself, and was found, his eyes red with weeping, sobbing, choking with childish rage, heartbroken.

Child's Fury. No one but a jealous child can tell what thoughts, what hopes, what rage animated him. He killed Gladys on Saturday. She was buried yesterday. And yesterday, in his home on New street, Emmet Robinson, with his mother, told her he wanted "the baby to go away." Once she caught him striking Gladys; once he upset the cradle in which she lay.

At 8 o'clock Saturday evening Mrs. Robinson left Emmet in a room with the sleeping Gladys. He was on the floor playing with a bronze statuette which, to amuse him, his mother had taken from the mantelpiece. Mrs. Robinson heard Emmet's shrill voice calling: "Mamma, hurry, come look at baby!" She rushed into the room. By the cradle stood Emmet grasping the statuette, which was covered with blood. A glance at the baby's head told the mother that Gladys was desperately injured. Not daring to leave her, Mrs. Robinson seized him, grabbed the statuette, and hurled him into another room in which she locked him. Then she ran for Dr. D. K. Kline.

Dr. Kline's verdict was that Gladys was dead. Her skull was fractured. Dr. Kline is quite positive that Emmet destroyed six blows with the statuette, which weighs a pound and a half. Necessarily, he had struck all the blows before he called his mother to look at baby.

Thinks It Was Deliberate. Coroner Bittig, who held an inquest, said yesterday: "It is a remarkable instance of infantile crime. 'I am convinced that the boy knew just what he was doing, and that he deliberately intended to make away with his sister. A New Way to Preserve Food.
An ingenious method of preserving food has recently been devised which is based on the fact that powdered gelatin, when the same material, not only do not spoil, but are capable of protecting incorporated substances from oxidation, acid and other agencies which bring about decomposition. Thus to make a concentrated beef extract, tea or coffee extract, soup, etc., the liquid is released with one per cent of primary gelatin, which differs from the commercial article in not having the gelid taste of the latter.

Self-Propelled Railway Cars.
In England the self-propelled railway car is coming into extensive use, especially for branch lines where the traffic is so small as not to warrant the operation of steam locomotives or the application of electricity. Recently the largest electrical manufacturing firm in America has ordered in England an oil engine for this purpose, which will be used with a dynamo to generate current for ordinary car motors. The advantage of such an installation is that there is no loss of fuel when the car is not in motion, and that the motor can be put into operation at an instant's notice.

Wins Laurels on Typewriter.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Miss Mary E. Pretty, who broke the world's record several days ago by writing 2,000 words on a typewriter in seven hours, has been named the new champion in Miss Olive R. Cameron, one of her fellow clerks in the Interior department, who received a new record of 2,000 words in six hours and written 2,000 words. About a year ago she wrote an average of sixty-five words a minute, now she averages 125 a minute.
