MEMPHIS, Oct. 18.—C. K. G. Billings' Lou Dillon, the champion trotting mare, went down to defeat today before Major Delmar, owned by E. E. Smathers, in the third and last contest for the Memphis gold cup, the feature race of the opening day of the fourth annual meeting of the Memphis Trotting association.

Major Delmar, who has heretofore seldom participated in the class games, are now in earnest and will give the seniors a hard game. At a meeting held yesterday, Edward D. Thomas was elected captain of the team and Roscoe Groo manager. George C. Riser, graduate manager of the university football team, has been secured as coach.
