Mormonism the Issue in Idaho.

Polygamy Cannot Be Punished Under the Present Law.

How the Budge Family Controls the Courts in Bear Lake County.

Special to the Tribune. MOUNTAIN HOME, Ida., Oct. 31.—The Hon. Frank Gooding—Dear Sir—I am most gratified that you announce that you will favor legislation against adultery. I myself favored this at the Lewiston convention. The Democratic party of the State favors legislation against adultery. I am safe in saying that all the influence which our candidate for Governor, Henry Heffelford, and myself have will be used to secure adequate legislation against the crime of adultery.

I have a right to assume that your publication, which you favor legislation against adultery, means that you favor legislation against the practices of the Mormon people, as well as against the practices of immoral people who are not Mormons. Under present conditions, a statute against adultery could not reach the Mormons, nor could any law which is aimed at polygamy, bigamy, adultery, or cohabitation of unlawful cohabitants.

Budge Family of Idaho.

To make this plain, allow me to illustrate. William Budge, the president of the Bear Lake stake, in an open letter signed by himself, admits that he has three wives. He says they are permanent and he will not abandon them. It is known that children have been born to him from these polygamous wives since the issuance of the manifesto in 1852, by the president of the Mormon church, pledging that polygamy living would cease among the Mormons.

I proceed against President Budge for adultery, you would have to begin with the prosecuting attorney of the county in which he lives. The prosecuting attorney of his county (Bear Lake) is his son. If you could manage to induce his son to begin the suit, it would be tried before the judge of the district, the brother of the district, embracing the counties of Bannock, Oneida and Bear Lake, is Alfred Budge, another son of President Budge.

In addition to this, four-fifths of the judges of Bear Lake are polygamous relations. They command him for it. You cannot secure a jury if you can find the president of the stake, which would convict him for an offense which they would not commit.

Even the Sheriff.

You cannot sign an adultery law until the law is decided in the courts. For the purpose of the Republican ticket is Walter Hagar a polygamist. In addition to being a polygamist, he is the father-in-law of Alfred Budge, the judge of the district court in which Bear Lake county is situated.

It is apparent that no convictions against Mormons can be had under our present law, under existing circumstances. It would be extremely difficult to convict them for adultery under our present law.

If you want the people to believe that you intend to stop these immoral practices of the Mormon people, you must do all the convolutions under the existing law here had for unlawful cohabitation. The Supreme court of the United States has defined unlawful cohabitation as the holding out to the world of more than one woman as your wife.

Aimed at Polygamy.

You do not have to prove adultery, lewd cohabitation or sexual intercourse in order to prove unlawful cohabitation. It is enough to prove that more than one woman as your wife is necessary. This law was aimed at polygamy and polygamy is the practice. It was intended by this law to make it plain that there should be but one recognized wife in an American household.

As we will join with you in the passage of laws against adultery, which will reach Gentiles and Mormons alike, I hope you will join with us to secure the enactment of laws against unlawful cohabitation, which will reach all polygamous Mormons. Inasmuch as we cannot convict for any of these offenses under the present law, we are sure you will also join with us in the passage of laws which will reach all polygamous Mormons, inasmuch as we will join with you in the passage of laws against adultery, which will reach Gentiles and Mormons alike, I hope you will join with us to secure the enactment of laws against unlawful cohabitation, which will reach all polygamous Mormons.

Submits a Proposition.

As you evidently want to be understood as intending to suppress these practices, I propose the following: That we will enact laws against adultery, which will reach Gentiles and Mormons alike, I hope you will join with us to secure the enactment of laws against unlawful cohabitation, which will reach all polygamous Mormons.

That we will enact legislation which will compel the trial of these cases before judges in communities and with juries which are not Mormon.

Conference Turned Into Republican Rally

Interference of Dominant Church in Political Affairs Reaches a Climax in Cache County.

At the Sunday night session of the quarterly conference of the Cache stake of Zion, the meeting was turned over to the Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association. H. Hulbert, Jr., a prominent Republican, is the president of the organization, and John A. Hendrickson, an equally prominent Republican worker, is his first counselor.

F. J. Holton of Box Elder county, the Republican nominee for District Attorney, is in the county conducting his campaign, and Messrs. Bullen and Hendrickson conceived the brilliant idea of making Mr. Holton the main speaker of the evening. Mr. Holton made a long and somewhat eloquent speech and the Sunday night session of conference was practically turned into a Holton rally.

POWERS IN CACHE COUNTY.

Judge Makes a Rapid Swing Around the Circle.

Special to the Tribune. LOGAN, Utah, Oct. 31.—Judge O. W. Powers made a rapid and brilliant swing around the circle in Cache county today. At 10 o'clock this morning he spoke to a large crowd at Newton. At 1 o'clock he addressed the citizens of Mendon. He spoke at Wellsville, the home of Congressman Howell, at 6 o'clock and at 9 he was at a rally at Hyrum. Judge Powers devoted most of his time to a dignified discussion of national and State issues, but at each point found time to denounce the plans of some of the Republican speakers on trying to arouse church influence against him.

BANDIT IS SHOT.

Wounded by Officer While He Was Holding Up Saloon.

TUCSON, Ariz., Oct. 31.—A masked man with pistol in hand, entered one of the largest saloons in the city today and ordered all present to hold up their hands. There were eight players at the card table and these were stood up against the wall. The highwayman proceeded to help himself to the coin in sight.

At this point Officer Wheeler of the Rangers, appeared on the scene and opened fire on the bandit. They exchanged shots and the bandit fell wounded. While he lay on the floor he placed his pistol to his temple and fired, but the wound caused is not a fatal one. The highwayman had an accomplice on the outside of the place who fired one shot at Wheeler, but missed him. The wounded bandit is in the hospital and his wounds are serious.

BANK BUILDING TUMBLES.

Collapses in Memphis, Burying Eight People in Debris.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 31.—A building occupied by the Continental Savings bank collapsed today, burying a number of persons. Eight have been rescued, including F. Chase, president of the Continental Savings bank; F. J. Baum, cashier; Clarence Heningsburg, teller; W. H. Stotts, a real estate dealer; and Joseph Flecher. With the exception of Fischer their injuries are not serious. No bodies have been found. Excavations made for an adjoining building caused the collapse.

So far as known, only one person, a negro saloon porter, remains under the debris.

GOLDFIELD GREAT CAMP.

Nevada Man Tells President His Town Greatest Gold Camp in World.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—William G. Tiffany of Nevada paid his respects to President Roosevelt. His nephew was in the rough riders and lost his life. Mr. Tiffany, who is a Harvard graduate, speaking of affairs in general in Nevada, said the greatest gold fields in the world have been discovered there.

"Six months ago," said Mr. Tiffany, "the mining town of Goldfield, Nev., had a population of 300. There are today 10,000 persons in the town, and people are flocking there each week by the hundreds. The famous Comstock lode in Nevada yielded \$600,000,000 in gold. I predict that the Goldfield region will yield more than twice as much. I do not know any place where the prospects are so great."

DYING MAN IN DOCK.

Victim of Consumption on Trial for a Murder.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 31.—John Kay, 15 years old and apparently dying of consumption, was placed on trial today for the murder of John Spittal last February. Kay contracted consumption in jail. He is so weak he can hardly sit up in the dock. The evidence against him is entirely circumstantial.

Conditions Disturbed in Morocco.

PARIS, Oct. 31.—Owing to the disturbed condition of Morocco, the French Government is sending reinforcements of men to the frontier and is holding ready two warships to go to ports in the disturbed districts.

British Warships at Gibraltar.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The Associated Press is officially informed that the British naval force now at Gibraltar is composed of four ironclad battleships, thirteen first-class armored and other cruisers and a strong flotilla of torpedo-boat destroyers.

SITUATION IN STATE OF IDAHO

Chairman Jackson on the Outlook.

Borah's Failure to Pursue His Challenge to Dubois Hurts Republicans.

Feeling Generally Is That His Bluff Was Called by Affidavits of Owen.

Special to the Tribune. BOISE, Ida., Oct. 31.—Charles H. Jackson, chairman of the Democratic State committee, reached Boise this morning after making a visit in the five northern counties in Idaho.

In speaking of the political conditions of north Idaho, he said that public opinion was generally with the Democratic party. At all of the meetings which he addressed with Mrs. Anna McKean White, the representative of the Society of Women for Patriotic and Christian Work, large audiences were present, and after each meeting large numbers of ladies asked to meet Mrs. White, and assured her that regardless of politics they and their friends would support the Democratic ticket because of the Mormon plank.

To Suppress Polygamy.

At one place a Congregational minister, who stated he was a Republican, said that he and all of his church would vote solidly in support of the plank to suppress polygamy and the interference of the Mormon church in State affairs. This, he explained, meant a change of at least 200 votes.

At Moscow, in Latah county, the audience completely packed the building and as a result of this meeting Mrs. White was invited specially to return on Sunday to address a meeting of women exclusively in the afternoon and to deliver an address in the Presbyterian church.

Borah's Bluff Called.

Mr. Jackson, referring to the claims of Mr. Brady, chairman of the Republican State committee, said that he had seen Mr. Brady's estimate and wherever he went he found even Republicans laughing at the figures given. The local Republican leaders are dismayed and feel that Mr. Borah, in declining to pursue his challenge to Senator Dubois to prosecute to conviction any case of polygamy which might be furnished him, has dealt a severe blow to the party.

How People Feel.

The feeling generally is that Mr. Borah's bluff was called in good faith, when the twenty sworn complaints were placed in his hands by Charles Mostyn Owen, and that it is a pitiful carrying out of the contract between the State and the lumber companies with no further extension of time and the demand for the taxation of timber. Wherever the knowledge of this circular is carried, the complaints are sworn to if bona fide cases are submitted to him for prosecution under his offer.

What Corporations Are Doing.

Some corporations are working against the Democratic party, notably the Pine Dealers' Association of Spokane, which has sent out a circular advising all members of that association to vote and work for the Republican ticket. A deliberate effort is evidently being made by the large lumber corporations to defeat the Democratic party, because of the plank in the Democratic platform which insists upon the carrying out of the contract between the State and the lumber companies with no further extension of time and the demand for the taxation of timber.

IS INDIAN A CITIZEN?

Supreme Court of U. S. May Have to Decide Question.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—If a motion filed by Attorney Crane of Holton, Kan., is granted, the Supreme court of the United States will be called on to decide whether an Indian becomes a citizen of the United States by taking land in severalty.

The case is that of Albert Neff of Kansas, who has been sentenced in the United States District court to pay a fine of \$200 and serve a term of four months in prison on the charge of selling beer to a Kickapoo Indian.

Mr. Crane asks the court for a writ of habeas corpus releasing Neff from imprisonment, on the ground that Neff, who owns land in severalty, is by virtue of that fact a citizen of the United States, thus rendering inapplicable the statute making it a misdemeanor to sell intoxicants to Indians. Neff has served one week of his sentence.


