

MAID TO RAISE PRICE OF WHEAT

Exchange Figure 10 Cents Higher.

Increase Was Necessary to keep the Grain in the State.

Milling wheat is in great demand in Missouri, Texas, Tennessee and other eastern states.

Millers and flour merchants have again found it necessary to raise the price of wheat in order to keep it in the state. Eastern buyers, especially in Missouri, Texas and Tennessee, have been making efforts to secure every carload of Utah milling wheat possible and have been paying 95 cents in carload lots. At the meeting of the Grain and Flour Merchants' exchange yesterday, the rise in price was decided upon, and where local dealers have heretofore been able to secure the good milling wheat at \$1 a bushel, they will now be obliged to pay \$1.10.

EXPLAINING THE PLAN.

Water Users Take Favorable View of the Government Irrigation Project.

Representative water users of the east side of Salt Lake yesterday forenoon at the headquarters of the Arid Land Reclamation Fund commission in this city and had explained to their entire satisfaction the details of the articles of incorporation of the Utah Water Users' association under the Bear Lake-Duchesne irrigation project. In the afternoon a similar meeting of water users of the west side of the county was held at the same place.

CALLING FOR EXHIBITS.

Real Estate Association Wants Every County to be Represented.

As a means of extending the scope and representative character of the association's exhibit in this city, the Salt Lake Real Estate association at its meeting yesterday authorized Secretary Miller to request communications to the county officials of every county in Utah, asking them to take official action looking to the furnishing of the information bureau with special exhibits of resources and products which shall be typical of each locality. For example, Carbon county is noted for its coal and building stone, Washington for its apples and semi-tropical fruits, Beaver for its copper and lead, Davis for its apples, and Box Elder, for honey and it is desired that the association have special exhibits which shall give these and other localities the credit which they deserve.

Gun Company Incorporates.

Articles of incorporation of the Utah Automatic Gun company have been filed with the county clerk. The object and business of the company is to manufacture arms and ammunition and other things for the destruction and intimidation of wild birds, and also for the protection of orchards, vineyards and domestic animals.

Ten Men Fall Several Hundred Feet

Cage Carrying Miners to Work Drops in Pennsylvania Colliery and All Are Killed.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 2.—

During the lowering of the miners at the Auchloch shaft of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western company at Nanticoke, eight miles south of here, today, the cage load of men was dropped to the bottom of the shaft, a distance of several hundred feet. Ten men were in the cage at the time and all of them were killed.

It is said that the accident was not caused by the cable rope breaking, but that something went wrong with the machinery in the engine-room and the cage was carried with great force against the sheaves. It left its fastenings and fell into the sump at the bottom, which contained six feet of water, and the men who were not killed by the shock and force of the fall were drowned. A number of rescuers are now at work clearing the place of the debris which covers the bodies of the men.

The victims, who were miners and laborers, resided in Nanticoke, and most of them leave families. They were Poles or Slavs, with the exception of one, John Kemper.

There are seventy-five miners and laborers in the mine dragging the sump for the bodies, and it may require two or three days before any of the dead can be recovered.

TURNED ON THE GAS.

Russian in Denver Attempts Suicide on Account of Reverses to Russia.

DENVER, Nov. 2.—After reading of the reverses of the Russian forces in the war with Japan and the threatening attitude of England because of the North Sea incident, Tony Lascoras, a Russian, attempted suicide by inhaling illuminating gas. He is now at the county hospital in a critical condition.

WOMAN HELD FOR BURGLARY

Money and Jewelry Worth \$3000 Found in Her Possession.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—Mrs. Grace Squire, who is accused of burglary, was before Judge Cabanias today, but the case was continued to await the arrival of her husband, who is in the interior of the state. She is a well-dressed woman of refined manners and is said to be a native of the East, though the detectives have not yet fully traced her history. She was first arrested for cutting the wires of Mrs. Henry Campbell on Turk street. Money and jewelry worth over \$3000 were found in her rooms, many samples of stolen goods in the possession of the police. Mrs. Squire today swore to a second charge of burglary against Mrs. Squire, who positively asserts her innocence of all the accusations. The police are seeking to secure the identification of several articles recently stolen from Mrs. Hattie Wallace at a fashionable apartment house.

DEDICATED TO ROOSEVELT.

French Clerical Writer Issues Volume "In Country of Strenuous Life."

PARIS, Nov. 2, 7 p. m.—The Abbe Klein, a prominent clerical writer, whose work on "Americanism" and "Life of Dr. Hecker," created an agitation, has just issued a volume entitled "In the Country of Strenuous Life." It is dedicated to President Roosevelt, and describes men, institutions and affairs in the United States. A chapter is devoted to the Abbe's visit to the White House and his interview with President Roosevelt. Owing to the impending reorganization of the French church system the book's exposition of the American church system is attracting widespread attention.

BATTLE WITH WILDCAT.

Fisherman and Animal Fight in Susquehanna River.

SUSQUEHANNA, Pa., Nov. 2.—"Bill" Rogers of the Cascade, while bass fishing in the Susquehanna river, saw a wildcat swimming across the stream in front of him, and cast a line in the cat's ear, and it turned and swam toward the boat. Rogers tried to paddle away, but the cat caught the boat and began to climb in. "Bill" knew the animal on the head with the paddle, and the movement capsize the boat. Then there was a savage battle in the water. The fisherman defended himself so well with the paddle that he was able to reach the shore. The wildcat followed, but a few well-directed blows finished it. Rogers lost his fishing outfit, but the county commissioners will give him \$2 for the wildcat's scalp.

Independence of Panama.

COLON, Nov. 2.—Preparations are on foot throughout the isthmus to celebrate the first anniversary of the Republic of Panama. The festivities will last three days, beginning tomorrow. The Panamanians proclaimed their independence on November 3, 1903.

BIG RESERVOIR BURSTS WALL

Nine Persons Perish in Accident.

Five More Are Fatally Injured, Buried in the Debris.

Thirteen Residences Destroyed and Territory Over Mile Square Devastated.

WINSTON SALEM, N. C., Nov. 2.—Nine people are known to be dead, with five fatally injured, as the result of the bursting of the reservoir at this place today. One of the brick walls of the reservoir collapsed, burying the home and family of Martin Peoples. Colored Settlement Wrecked.

A million and a half gallons of water were released and over a mile of territory was devastated. Thirteen residences were destroyed. The colored settlement in the vicinity of the reservoir was entirely wrecked. Mayor Eaton is at the head of a large rescue party, and search is being made for additional victims.

HE TALKED TO REPORTERS.

Witness in Will Contest Case Gets Badly Tangled Up.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The taking of testimony in the Dolbeer will contest was resumed today, with Dr. Homer Gibney again a witness under examination. He was closely questioned regarding what took place on the night that Miss Dolbeer fell or jumped from the window of her room in the Waldorf-Astoria.

ATTEMPT TO BURN PALACE.

Anarchists Seek to Destroy Italian Records of State.

MILAN, Italy, Nov. 2.—An attempt made by anarchists to set fire to the Palace of Justice early Monday was discovered in time to prevent serious damage. But this has been followed by a similar attempt directed against the great palace in which the archives of state are preserved.

MONEY FOR THE ARMY.

What Estimates for Fiscal Year Ending June 30 Call For.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The estimates of the War department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1905, aggregate \$14,686,199. This is \$2,342,612 less than the War department estimates submitted a year ago, and \$3,822,588 less than the total appropriations made for the use of the War department for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1905.

Poison in Pudding Causes Two Deaths

Arsenic Put in Dish Which Is Sent to Theatrical Boarding-House.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Two persons who ate part of a pudding sent to a theatrical boarding-house in West Forty-third street are dying in Roosevelt hospital, a third is in a critical condition, and the police are scouring that part of the city in an effort to locate the messenger who left the package at the door. It is believed that the sender of the package planned the death of the entire household with an idea of revenge for some unknown cause. Had the pudding reached the dinner table, as was intended, the lives of a score of persons would have been imperiled.
