BANK CLERKS FAVOR B.I.L.

Local Association Declares for Clean Currency Measure.

Salt Lake bank clerks have declared themselves heartily in favor of the Gaines clean currency bill, and at a meeting held in the Commercial clubrooms last night resolutions were passed indorsing the same. The bill provides that not only torn or mutilated paper money be exchanged for new currency, but that dirty, oily, badly creased or worn bills of every denomination be exchanged as well. Bills of the smaller denomination are naturally the ones that are in circulation and these are the ones that soon become actually filthy. In fact, it is well known that contagious diseases have often been spread by the exchange of currency. The bill also provides that all such money as is soiled by the government at the expense of the latter, in amounts of not less than \$100.
