

SWELL DINERS FOR NEW ROAD

Elegant Cars Arrived Yesterday.

Pullman Sends Out Latest and Most Artistic Creations in This Class.

Eight Cars Here for the Limited Service to Be Inaugurated Between This City and Los Angeles.

Should any Salt Laker retain a doubt as to the excellence of the passenger service to be created between this city and Los Angeles on the Salt Lake Route, a trip to the station today will remove any possible misgivings.

They are beauties and are undoubtedly the finest cars of the class ever brought to this city.

There are eight cars, numbered 709 to 716, inclusive. Each is seventy feet long, full vestibuled and equipped with the latest and most durable appliances.

The number is placed at each end on the sides. The windows are double, with arched tops of stained glass and here and there a small oval window.

dark skylights are also of stained glass. The windows of the pantry and kitchen are placed high up to prevent the work from being seen by the passengers.

The front end of the car, reached through the rubber-tired vestibule, contains the cigar cases, the wine lockers and the standard Pullman heater.

The interior is rarely beautiful, although not at all gaudy. At the rear comes the buffet, linoleum, water coolers and the seats for waiters.

Here are all conveniences for keeping silverware and dishes and a brass holder for cutting knives to the kitchen runs through the partition.

The long mahogany hall runs alongside the vestibule, the rubber-tired vestibule is entered by a separate door at the rear. Here is a mammoth Stearns range with burners, battery, electric lights and gas.

Disease Continues Its Ravages in New York City. NEW YORK, March 25.—Cases of cerebro-spinal meningitis continues to be reported in this city, three deaths having occurred in the past twenty-four hours.

An experiment of trephining the skull has been tried on a boy 9 years old at Flower hospital and has apparently been successful. The operation was performed nearly a week ago and since then the patient anxiously in the hope that a method of treatment of the mysterious disease might be found. It is said he has shown signs of relief and hope are entertained for his ultimate and complete recovery.

CASTRO IS HOSTILE. His Attitude Particularly Menacing Against French Cable Company. PARIS, March 25.—An official dispatch from Caracas, Venezuela, says President Castro, who was absent from the capital during the recent supposed amelioration of the situation, has returned and has manifested strong hostility against American and French interests.

His attitude, it is added, is particularly menacing against the French cable company. It is premature to say what steps France will take, as the information has just been received, and the officials have not had opportunity to consider it.

However, it is likely that their action will depend upon President Castro putting his menaces into effect by overt acts against the company or the forfeiture of its concessions. No orders for warships to be sent in, reading as have yet been issued or contemplated for the present, but there seems to be a growing impression in official quarters that the presence of a communications between the two governments toward eventual action along similar lines.

Russian Squadron in Canal. PORT SAID, Egypt, March 25.—The division of the Russian Second Squadron, commanded by Admiral Nebeski, which reached here from Suda Bay, island of Crete, yesterday, entered the canal this morning.
