Spokane won the third game in the series with Salt Lake at the ball park yesterday by a score of 5 to 1, owing to an inability to hit at opportune times and general all-round dumb work, the outfield being guilty of some rank misplays.

The first chance for a run for the Elders came in the first inning after the same trick on a fly ball from Hammons, but Simon's clever stop of O'Brien's hard smash, Hammond's fly to stop and Brock's error, Maxie and Haynes, had to bait in with a bum turn at the wrong time in the afternoon's programme and spoiled all chance for the audience to witness a good show. "Haynes" slipped up on his attempt to juggle the cannon ball which drove out of him and dropped it. "Maxie" to show that he was there with his end of the "brother act" performed the same trick on a fly ball from Hammons. These acrobatic stunts resulted in three Swashes romping over the rubber and gave Prof. Durhan a bad case of hemorrhoids, which caused him to retire from the game, Thomas taking his place.

In their half of the same inning the local team managed to squeeze out the only run of the game—for them. Reilly cleared first on the Four-Ball Overland Route, along with Bertie Delmas as a partner in the same line.
