FOREMAN WINS LATONIA DERBY

VETERAN ED GEERS.

Silent Man of Harness World Is Again Out.

Geers has always maintained that walking sticks and canes were made for dudes or cripples and as he does not profess to be a dude and has no desire to be a cripple, the change in his behavior since he lost his stick would make merry many of his admirers were they able to see the veteran handling the many promising green pacers and trotters.

Speed in Green Trotter.

During the past week Geers found a lot of speed in Hal Hardy, a green trotter, when he allowed him his head for once around the local oval. Hal Hardy is a brother to Hal Chaffin, who was campaigned successfully by Geers two years ago, and who, in Geers's opinion, may have developed into another Billy Buch but for the accident that placed him out of commission during the local season. Hal Hardy is being trained for many engagements this year, and may show his first real speed possessions in the course of the meeting at Detroit. A mile in 2:18 1/2, with the half in 1:07, was the work that caused the railbirds to say nice things about the Silent Man.

Baron Gratton a Speedy Pacer.

Baron Gratton, the pacer that Geers was driving the day he received his injuries, has been sent a single mile in as good as 2:12, with faster time corresponding for the half mile. The winner of last year's Chamber of Commerce stakes is taking his work, locally, and Geers will again have charge of him for F. G. Jones.
