THE JERICHO ROAD.

We are told in the Scriptures that "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell among thieves." We are told in a news item that a certain man came down from Wyoming to the Mormon Zion and fell among thieves.

The name "Jericho" signified in the Hebrew "fragrant," and the modern Zion is "fragrant." It is made so by the incense yielded up by the weaklings to the predatory classes of various sorts who lurk for the unwary.

It is an old saying that the weak always fall into the hands of the vicious. It is seldom admitted by the vicious that they are vicious, vicious though they be. But victims are always found on the Jericho road, and at times the vicious consider it a heavenly duty to strip them.

SHOULD NOT WAIT FOR SMITH.

The Tribune is always in favor of taking sufficient time to prepare the plans and details of any public work. But it is not in favor of wasting time on mere whims of a monopolistic corporation.

There is no reason whatever why the municipality should await the whims or plots of this arrogant despot. There appears to be a wholly indefensible disposition to do nothing about clinching the water supply needed by the city, which is claimed without legal basis by this greedy monopoly.

We do not conceive this to be the true course. The Smith company sent its arrogant demand to the Council in the first place, in the form of an outrageous draft for an ordinance which would have given the Smith concern a mortgage on this city for a hundred years, with power of unlimited loot and pillage.

Now, what is the situation? Does the city ask anything of the company? No; it asks nothing from it. Does it desire anything claimed by the company? Yes; it desires the water privilege formerly used by the Granite Paper company, at the mouth of Big Cottonwood, which the Smith corporation now claims, but which has no doubt been forfeited by non-user.

SALT LAKE AS REGISTRATION POINT.

The movement to make Salt Lake City a registration point for those who wish to participate in the drawing for homesteads on the Utah Indian reservation lands to be thrown open for settlement, is attaining the importance which is justly its due.

This is so evident, that one naturally looks for a reason for ignoring the palpable facts, and inquires what that reason might be. The most plausible one is in line with the play of the hierarchy for advantage to their followers in these drawings.

It is important, in the view of the hierarchy, therefore, that Salt Lake, the Gentile and soldier city, should be excluded as a place of registration, since to allow applicants to register there would be to concede the Gentiles and the old soldiers some chance to get homes on the reservation.

But where is Senator Sutherland all this while? Why does he not stand up for the rights of those who are not Mormons, but who certainly have a right as American citizens to be considered? Can it be possible that he is merely "Smoot's man" and unable to stand up for justice and fairness in this registration? If he is joined unto the Mormon idol, what show does any non-Mormon have for the protection of his rights by any of the three members of Congress (two Senators and one Representative) from Utah?

THE RESERVATION WATER FILINGS.

It is a clear case that the attempt to file upon and monopolize the waters of the Utah reservation must be defeated. The lands which are to be drawn for, and filed upon would be absolutely valueless to the homesteaders if they could not have this water to irrigate them.

We do not believe that either the National or the State authorities could with any sort of consistency or fairness permit the water to be monopolized in the way proposed. It is said, for example, that one man has filed upon enough water to irrigate eighty thousand acres of land. That means, not genuine settlement, but a grab to enable one person or company to put hundreds of land claimants at the mercy of the owner or owners of this one water filing.

It has always been the practice in this State to have the water go with the land, as a necessary appurtenance. The same practice should be made to prevail on these reservation lands. All filings on water should be disregarded until the prospective settlers have made their land selections, and then the waters available for the irrigation of the land should be filed on by the land owners, each according to his need.
