TIPPING AND THE LAW. Utter Helplessness of Curing the Evil by Legislation.

New York's so-called anti-tipping law, which went into effect last Friday, is likely to share the fate of a similar statute enacted by the Wisconsin Legislature at its last term.

The tipping evil is not to be remedied by legislation. Probably it will not be remedied at all, because it is the outgrowth of human selfishness and human vanity.

People who tip are of two classes—those who do so as a bribe for better service than is rendered to others and those who do so for fear of being thought mean.

The other forty-three States of the Union may follow the example of Wisconsin, but the tipping will go on until the tipper realizes his selfishness or his cowardice—Chicago Chronicle.
